HULL TO MAKE KEYNOTE TALK AT LIMA MEET

OTHERS TO SPEAK

Hull, Foreign Ministers

To Help Chart Course

Of 21 Republics

LIMA, Peru, Dec. 10—

(P)—The Pan-American Conference looked to Secretary Cordell Hull and the foreign ministers of Argentina and Peru today for keynote speeches charting a course for the 21 republics of the Western Hemisphere.

Delegates thronging this hill-rimmed Peruvian capital evinced keen interest in the three speeches, scheduled for a late afternoon session, which were expected not only to call for closer Pan-American cooperation but perhaps to indicate how far their respective governments were willing to go in that direction.

With Secretary Hull on the second day of the conference program were Foreign Minister Jose Maria Canillo of Argentina and Dr. Carlos Concha, foreign minister of Peru.

Peru's dynamic president, Oscar Benavides, opened the conference amid colorful pageantry yesterday with the assertion that the Western Hemisphere "wishes to be strong in order to be respected."

Though stressing the community of ideals and interests that link American nations, Benavides was careful to say such unity did not cut the Western Hemisphere off from the rest of the world.

Soon after the formal opening, Assistant Secretary of State Adolf A. Berle, Jr., told a radio audience that the United States was not seeking military alliances with the Latin American republics.

Such a course was "obviously out of the question," Berle asserted, denying rumors he said were current.

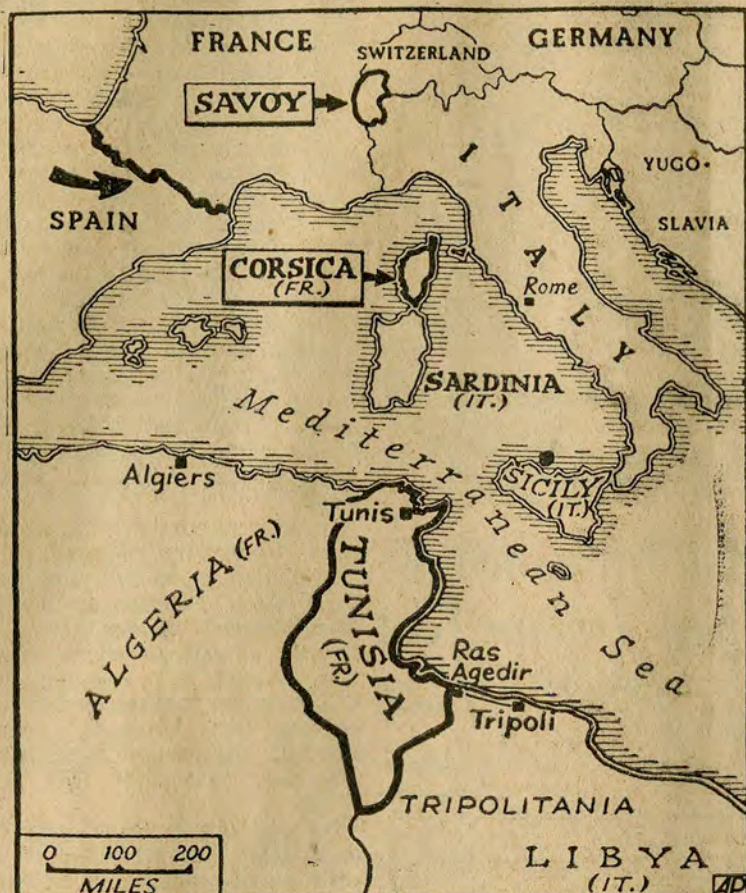
Nations of the Western Hemisphere "have not lived under a system of military alliances, nor so far as I know does any of them care to start such a system now," he declared.

Cooperation Seen
Among delegates, however, there were indications an outright declaration for mutual assistance in case of foreign aggression might be made by the conference.

Now that the Cuban and Argentine delegations have broken the ground by submitting projects for consideration, the first condemning racial persecution and the second advocating regular meetings among the American foreign ministers for mutual consultation, it was expected the various delegations would come forward with proposals they have been keeping up their sleeves.

The Argentine proposal, first

PLANS MAPPED FOR SHORT ROUTE TO ALTAR DISTRICT

Safety Drives Cut Traffic Death Toll

(By The Associated Press)
Intensive, methodical safety campaigns have slashed sharply into the nation's traffic death toll this year.

A survey of 35 leading cities—all but one of them among the top 40 in population—showed today this situation for the first week of December:

Ten cut their death toll by 40 per cent or more, compared with the same period of 1937;

At least ten of the other 25 reducing their traffic mortality rate 15 to 35 per cent, with many others showing improvements; and only five apparently heading for an increased fatality list.

"Three E's"
The nation's population centers have accepted with the "Three E's"—enforcement, education and engineering—the challenge of the reckless driver, the jaywalking

A modern highway from Nogales to the "isolated" Altar district of Northwestern Sonora is the latest aim of civic leaders and officials of both border cities here.

Municipal President Gustavo Escobosa, of Nogales, Sonora, revealed yesterday that a committee had been appointed to work on the project, which if completed would divert considerable trade from other channels to Nogales.

Over treacherous terrain the highway winds its way to the Altar District, according to an artist's drawing. Abbreviating the present distance to Altar by fully 26 miles, the planned route would swing sharply West from Nogales to Saticum, Reforma, Tubutama, Otil, Oquitoa, and finally Altar, a distance of 154 kilometers (92) miles.

Present Route Long
The present route to Altar finds the traveler going to Santa Ana and then to Altar—a distance of almost 121 miles.

The Altar District, in which Sonora Governor Roman Yocupicio has begun a "colonization" project, includes a region of fertile, uncultivated, but ruggedly beautiful land. Here, thousands of farm-

CAPONE TO RETURN TO FIND GREAT CHANGE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Dec. 10—(P)—Al Capone is coming back next month but not to the Chicago he left in 1932 to serve a ten year Federal prison term for income tax evasion.

The scarfed Capone, onetime undisputed fuhner of Chicago's gangland empire, is scheduled to leave Alcatraz in San Francisco Bay on Jan. 19, 1939.

There is, however, a year's sentence in Cook County jail before he will actually be a free man. Then?

"He'll come out a law abiding citizen," aver his attorneys. "He's taken his punishment like a man, hasn't he?"

State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney's staff decline comment on its intentions but Courtney's men have been very busy the past several months axing up the bookie gambling houses controlled by "the syndicate" and reputedly directed by some of Al's surviving associates on the "public enemy" lists of the city.

The group has been little in the public eye as individuals of late and the gangland slayings which brought death to 701 men during the 12 years the hoodlums battled over lucrative bootleg, vice and gambling territories have sloughed off to a dozen this year.

Lush Money Gone
Capone, now 41, was boss of a reputed \$100,000,000 racketeering empire before the Federal government put the finger on him.

When he returns he will find the lush money days of the prohibition era have disappeared.

The huge profits of illicit breweries—beer once sold at \$1 a bottle—have faded into insignificance. The extensive rackets to which the law-abiding citizen paid unwilling tribute have largely been stamped out.

Most of the former ganglord's cronies, triggermen, and leading chiefs of staff will be missing, too. They have been largely decimated by bullets, natural death and the law.

Convicted on five of 23 counts charging failure to file returns and pay a tax of \$215,080 on an estimated income of \$1,038,694 for the years 1925 to 1929, Capone began serving time May 4, 1932, at Atlanta, Ga., penitentiary, subsequently being transferred to Alcatraz. He became eligible for parole Sept. 9, 1935, but it was denied. His attorneys have tried in vain to get rid of that extra year's term, too.

Early this year Capone was suffering from "mental disturbances" and was under treatment, but it was never disclosed whether his physical and mental condition is such that it might affect the scheduled additional imprisonment.

The county jail sentence was imposed after Capone's conviction on misdemeanor counts charging failure to file tax reports. His Federal prison term was for evasion of taxes, a felony.

DALADIER WINS DEPUTIES' VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

MARGIN IS SMALL

French Premier Enabled

To Carry On Fight

Against Italy

PARIS, Dec. 10—(P)—Premier Daladier carved out a new but fragile majority in the Chamber of Deputies today, enabling him to carry on his strike smashing and his fight against Italy's colonial ambitions.

The "strong man" of France nevertheless, appeared to be the political prisoner of his own divided Radical-Socialist party.

In a riotous session of the chamber which lasted until 2:25 A. M. the best Daladier could wring from the quarrelling, shouting deputies was a majority of 74 votes out of the chamber's 618.

The vote of confidence was 315 to 241.

His new majority was based on conservative support, ranging all the way from his own moderately conservative party to the extreme right French social party—Colonel Francis de la Rocque's group of semi-Fascists.

The Socialists and Communists, who formerly joined with the radical Socialists to form the people's front, voted solidly against Daladier.

Three Roads
The premier seemed to be faced with three possible roads—all fraught with danger:

1—He may continue with the present shaky majority.

2—He may ask President Lebrun and the Senate to dissolve the chamber and go back to the people for new elections.

3—He may resign in the hope of forming a new government based on more solid parliamentary ground.

The last two steps, however, would only be "last resorts," his associates indicated.

Daladier's friends appeared to be convinced he would take the first road for the present, sounding out the parliamentary ground as he goes.

About 60 deputies, they pointed out, refrained from voting this morning—apparently to see which way the wind was blowing. The only ones who voted against the premier besides 228 Socialists and Communists were 13 members of his own party.

Murder Suspect To Be Returned

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 10—(P)—Thomas Lawshe, 26, wanted in Arizona as a suspect in the slaying of Virgil A. Vaughn, has signed a waiver of extradition. Federal authorities reported today.

Vaughn's body was found on the Arizona desert near Safford. His car, which had been stolen, was sold in Lake Providence, La., August 10, four days after the body was found, and Lawshe was arrested October 29 in New Orleans and charged with violation of the Dyer act.

Gov. R. C. Stanford of Arizona requested the extradition of Lawshe.

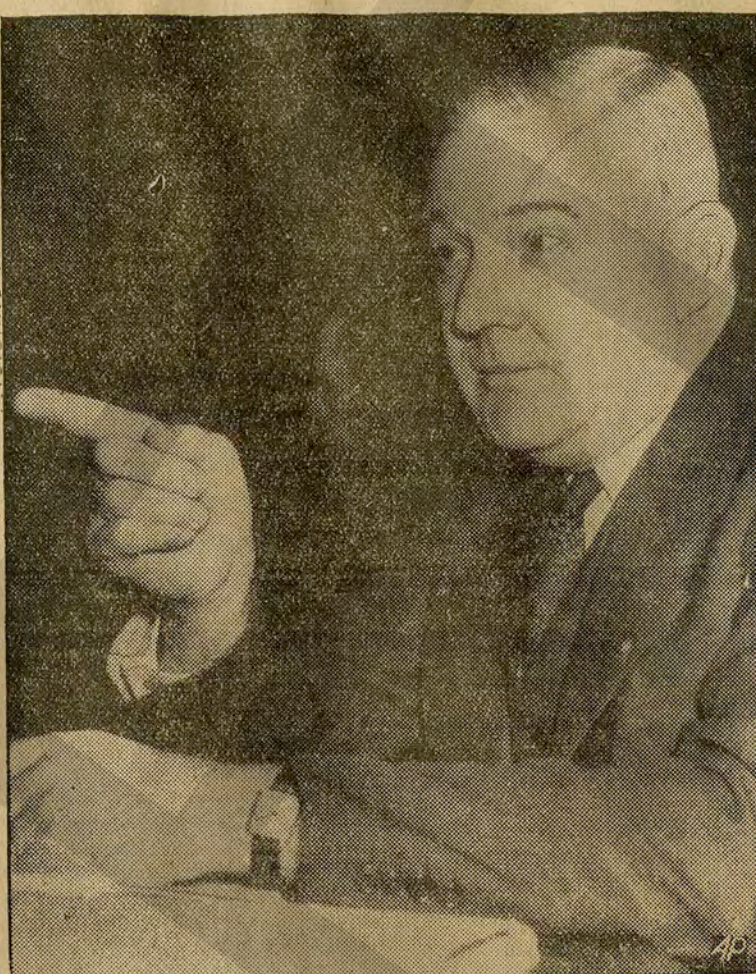
Means' Condition Seen 'Critical'

MONEY, HITLER COOPERATION REFUGEE NEEDS SAYS ENVOY

SOUTHAMPTON, Dec. 10—

(P)—United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy said today the major need in solving Europe's refugee problem was cooperation for an international loan and above all a little cooperation from Hitler.

"You can stop worrying about where to put the refugees now," he said. "That problem will be solved."

Kennedy discussed the refugee problem along with the war debts, personal plans and debutantes before sailing on the liner Queen Mary for the United States.

About war debts he said:

"I think we can probably make a deal with Great Britain about war debts, but I am afraid it will have to be a deal that public opinion in the United States is not prepared to accept."

Britain is not prepared to pay the whole debt and many people at home are against anything but a 100 cents on the dollar settlement."

No Official Discussions

He said he had never discussed the question officially "with any member of the British government for the simple reason that I had no instructions to do so."

About debutantes:

"We are going to limit the number of Americans presented at court even more next year than this year. Only those Americans who live over here will be considered."

As for his personal plans, he said:

"This is not a one-way trip. I never stay anywhere too long, but I am definitely coming back around February 1. I am just going home to rest and do some thinking about America."

He will meet his son, Jack in the United States. The rest of his family will take a vacation in Switzerland.

Kennedy was believed to be going home to study affairs in the United States since the November elections as well as to report on affairs in Europe. He expected to see President Roosevelt as soon as possible and to confer with Postmaster General James A. Farley before returning.

Defeat Seen For 'Free Hand' Bureau Bill

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—(P)

Some of the Senators who opposed the administration's reorganization bill in the last Congress predicted today the defeat of any new proposal to give President Roosevelt a free hand to reshuffle federal bureaus.

The President told a press conference yesterday he would recommend to the new Congress enactment of a reorganization bill, but said he had no idea whether there would be any fundamental changes from the measure which evoked a heated controversy last session.

In that connection Mr. Roosevelt commented that everyone agrees the government's administrative machinery should be made more efficient.

Senator McNary (D-Ore.), the minority leader, echoed this view, but added:

"Everyone is for reorganization if it will promote the efficiency of government and reduce the cost thereof. Everyone is willing to give a President power to abolish offices and bureaus and transfer and amalgamate the functions of bureaus."

"Want Control"

"But in my opinion the majority of Congress wants to have some control over arbitrary decisions by the President."

McNary told reporters that the reorganization program could not be enacted without an amendment giving Congress the veto power over presidential orders revamping the administrative setup.

Such an amendment was proposed by Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) during Senate consideration of the reorganization measure last session, but was defeated. The Senate then passed the bill, but it was pigeon-holed in the House.

Wheeler asserted today that the measure still could be enacted if

BRITON URGES PRESERVATION OF FREEDOM

GETS BIG OVATION

Former British Foreign

Secretary Drives For

Strong Defense

NEW YORK, Dec. 10—

(P)—Anthony Eden, trim former foreign secretary of Great Britain, spoke out emphatically last night for the preservation of the democracy which "we in England and you in America cherish most," and saw as the greatest threat to that democracy "a new form of idolatry, the worship of the state."

Eden's address to the National Association of Manufacturers was a ringing defense of democracy as "a university in which we learn from one another. It can never be a barracks where blind obedience is the first essential."

"It would indeed be the greatest irony in human history," he told the 4,000 persons at the banquet and a nation-wide radio audience, "if mankind were to allow all progress to be stifled by the setting up" of this "worship of the state to which all men must bow down, and to which they must sacrifice their freedom of faith, of speech, of worship."

"Man was not, in our view, made for the state. The state was made for man," he said.

"Must Stand Together"

The British statesman, who resigned his cabinet post in a difference of opinion with Prime Minister Chamberlain over policies toward dictatorships, stressed that Great Britain and the United States must stand firm together against the enemies of democracy and "we are acutely conscious of the need to defend ourselves."

Eden's first American audience gave him an ovation which he described as "one I shall never forget."

Describing himself as "an average Englishman here only on a friendly visit and in no wise official," Eden said, "we must be con-

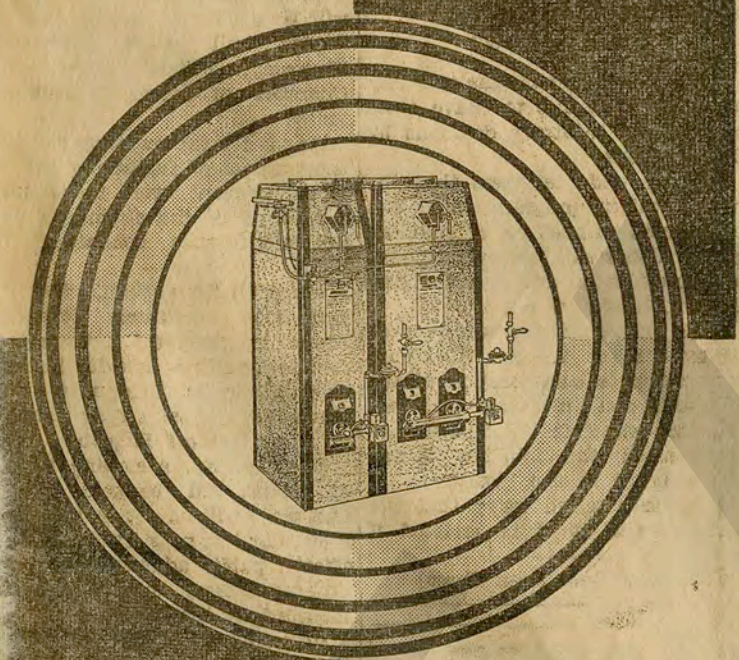

Lord North was the twelfth holder of a peerage created nearly 400 years ago. During the World War he served in France, commanding a battalion of the Royal Fusiliers. His grandson, John Dudley North, 21, succeeds to the title.

stantly re-examining our political faith and applying it to the conditions of the modern world.

"Every political system, be it democratic or autocratic, must continually evolve, and in the last resource the survival of democracy must depend upon the faith which it inspires, and the results which, through faith, it can achieve."

"Democracy must have the strength of the best tempered steel, not rigid, but supple," he added. "It must have the strength of the highest form of discipline—self discipline."

Emergency Pictured

Eden said "we know we are destined, in our land and in our time and in our generation, to live in a period of emergency of which none can see the end."

"If throughout that testing time," he added, "howsoever long or short it may be, we hold fast to our faith, cradle it in stone, and set steel to defend it, we can yet hang on our inheritance of freedom, intact to the generations that are to come."

Eden emphasized that "a false complacency is the worst calamity that can befall any nation in critical times."

"To realize then," he said, "the extent of the challenge that confronts us, and to be conscious of our own shortcomings, are both necessary. But to be conscious of shortcomings is not to proclaim that we are faint-hearted, still less to suggest that we are decadent. Let me say this with all emphasis."

Speaking of "certain standards in which we believe and which we will not yield up," Eden said:

"In our conception, a modern democratic state must be based upon racial and religious toleration. Each citizen must enjoy individual liberty, all must be equal before the law. The rights of minorities and majorities alike must be honored and respected. These beliefs are, we are convinced, the basis of all progress. As an Englishman addressing this great American audience tonight, I tell you that these are the beliefs of our English people still, and that they will hold to them in the years that lie ahead."

League Would Limit Use Of Gas Taxes

PHOENIX, Dec. 10.—(P)—The Arizona Municipal League will offer to the 14th legislature a constitutional amendment, patterned purpose other than street and after that of California, prohibiting use of gasoline taxes for any highway construction, improvement and maintenance.

"It is apparent," mayor Walter J. Thalheimer of Phoenix, league president, said, "that some definite action must be taken to safeguard the road user from misappropriation of the tremendous excise taxes he pays through the gasoline tax."

He urged that favorable action be taken on the amendment so as to "guarantee a fair deal to the autoist who uses the city streets, county roads and state highways."

The league has long advocated legislation providing for diversion of part of gasoline and sales tax revenue to incorporated municipalities. Any gas tax funds used by cities would finance street improvements, Thalheimer said.

dynamic young Maricopa, appears to have a commanding lead for speaker of the House.

Some of the points assertedly included in Governor-elect Jones' message to the 14th legislature have been slightly "distorted in transmission," according to a Jones spokesman.

"What the governor-elect said about the merit system," this column was told, "doesn't mean he favors examinations for all state employees. Instead he would reward them on a basis of ability and for their efforts."

"The next governor stands squarely on his platform," the spokesman continued, "but is not backing all of the ideas furthered by those professing to speak for him."

It is learned a move will be made to divorce the motor vehicle division from the State Highway Department, confining the latter entirely to road building and maintenance.

Under the proposed plan the motor vehicle division would be combined with the state highway patrol and the bureau of criminal identification.

Considerable consternation was caused in capitol quarters over Bob Jones' appointment of Sen. W. B. Kelly of Graham County as executive secretary, according to statehouse sources.

It has long been a practice at the capitol for political practitioners to stampee a new chief executive while he was occupied with learning the rigorous routine of the office. Not infrequently have "fast ones" been slipped over on unwary new officials.

There'll be none of this when Bob Jones becomes governor. No novice himself, with three state Senate terms under his belt, the next chief executive will have the cagey Mr. Kelly, whose political experience goes back to territorial days, at one elbow and the cautious, though youthful and alert, Kelvin M. Fox at the other.

One observer remarked that politicians who penetrate this protection must invent a few brand new ideas and spring them very early in the morning.

Reports that Governor-elect Jones is giving serious consideration to appointment of Scott J. Donnel, secretary of the Arizona Fair Commission, to secretaryship of the State Board of Public Institutions met with wide favor.

Mr. Donnel is said to have "earned" the position by the capable manner in which he has handled fair commission activities, including supervision of rebuilding the state fair grounds. In addition to his manifold duties he found time for the extra job of treasurer for the Democratic state central committee during the general campaign.

Mc Ahren. In the Professional building where Senator Kelly and Kel Fox hold forth, almost half a day slides past without a job-seeker showing up. When they do, they are reminded of Governor-elect Jones' declaration that department heads will do the hiring and be held responsible for efficiency of the personnel they select.

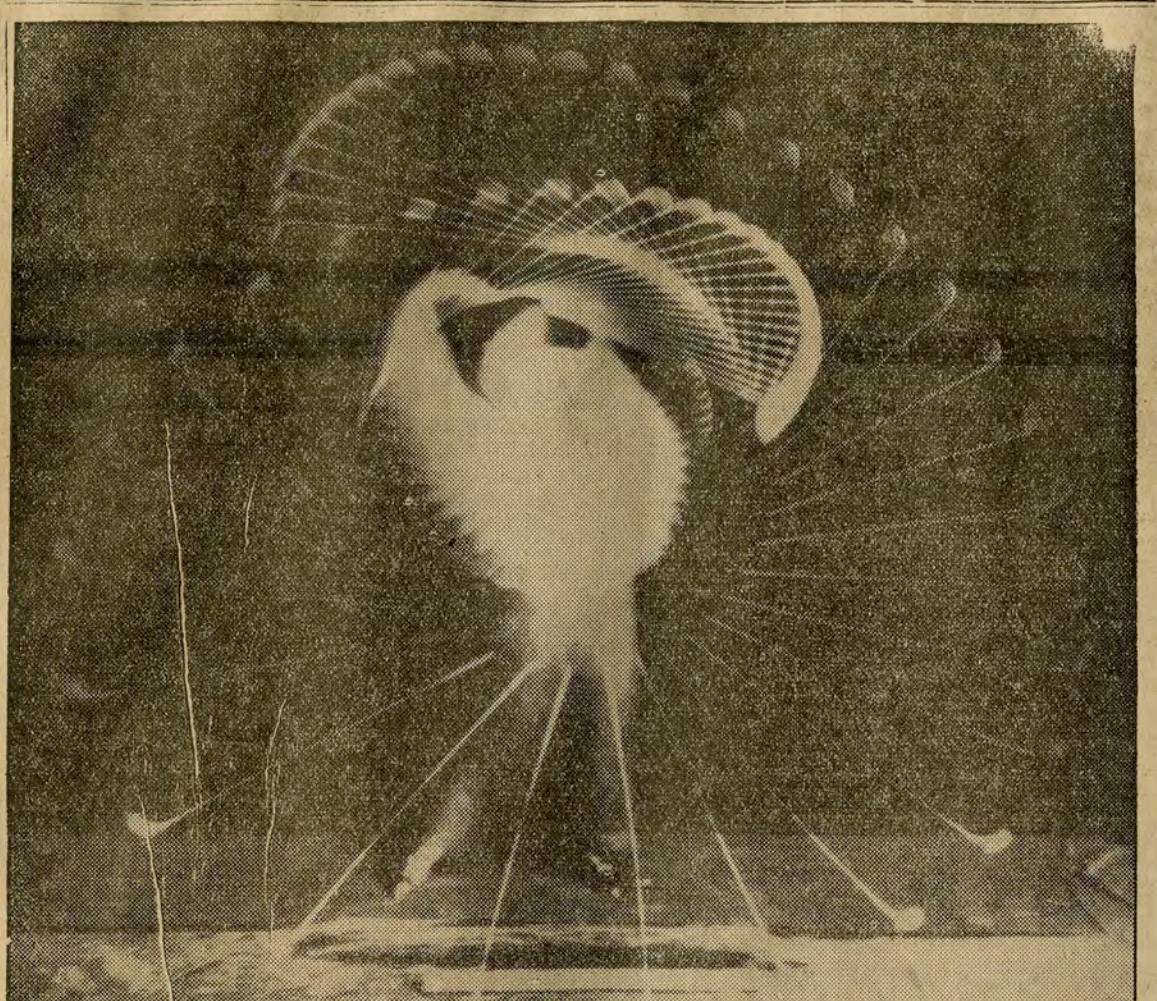

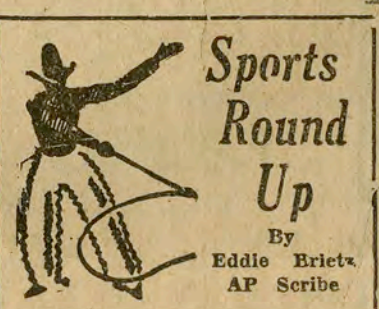

THREE WOMEN HURT AS TRAIN LEAVES RAILS

DEFIANCE, O., Dec. 10.—(P)—The Baltimore & Ohio railroad's East-bound Fort Pitt limited left the rails near here early today, causing injuries to three women sufficiently serious to require hospital treatment.

Many other passengers were treated for minor cuts and bruises at the scene of the accident near Holgate, 10 miles East of here.

The women were brought to a Defiance hospital by ambulance. Attendants said their condition was not serious.

R. M. Shaw, who drove the ambulance to the wreck reported eight of the train's 10 coaches were derailed. Some of these, he said, plunged deep into mud at the base of embankments.

The ambulance operator said two engines which drew the limited remained on the tracks.

"The steel cars sank almost five feet in the mud and many passengers were helped out through windows," Shaw said.

Nearly all passengers were taken to Deshler, about 25 miles East of here, and three boarded another East-bound train, Shaw said.

At Akron, Division Superintendent W. C. Baker said the cause of the derailment had not been determined. A spokesman said main line traffic was being rerouted.

Those treated here were Mrs. James Knowell, 40, of St. Paul, Minn.; Mrs. Michael Shaughnessy of Willard, Ohio, and Mrs. Helen Rowland, 42, of Chicago.

Mrs. Knowell and Mrs. Shaughnessy suffered severe cuts. The latter, like many other women passengers, had to be liberated from one of the overturned cars through shattered window.

Estimates of the number of passengers on the train varied from 60 to 125. Physicians said all of them were shaken up pretty badly. Trainmen express belief the tender behind the second of two locomotives was derailed, causing the cars to leave the rails.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(P)—The issue of governmental control as opposed to unlimited production confronted growers of three major crops today.

The Seven-Point Jones Program

(Arizona Republic)

THE seven-point legislative program that Governor-elect Jones plans to present to the 14th state legislature when it convenes early in January is an excellent one. Its greatest weakness lies in the magnitude of the program. Its scope is so wide that we fear the legislature will not be able in the time allotted to it to properly enact the program.

Every civic minded citizen will agree that the seven points Mr. Jones has outlined for the improvement of the state's government are badly needed. Every taxpayer will concede that one of the vital needs of the state is a lowering of taxation, though the taxpayers may not agree as to the method to be used in bringing about the reduction. The time has come in Arizona when an about-face must be made by the government. Mr. Jones recognizes this and it is very apparent that he plans to do something more about it than merely talk about it. A revision is needed and economy and efficiency must be substituted for waste and inefficiency if the cost of government is to be reduced. That can be done by action only, and not by talk.

The new governor is beginning his administration with the best wishes of every fair-minded citizen in the state. The election is over. Mr. Jones is the choice of the majority of the people for the office, but when he assumes that office on January 2 he will be the representative of all the people in the state, not merely those who voted for him. We feel that Mr. Jones aims to be the governor of all the people and not of just a part.

He is establishing a new precedent in going about the state and talking with the legislators-elect who will make up the legislative body in January, but his visits with these prospective lawmakers are an indication that Mr. Jones is sincere in his plans to give Arizona a better government. The legislators will be afforded an opportunity to study the program of the new governor before they reach the capital for the regular legislative session. The program will not be new to them nor will they have to waste legislative time in studying it.

Since we the people have elected both Mr. Jones and the members of the legislature, we the people should co-operate with them in putting over a program that will give a better state government and also one that will cost the taxpayers less than has resulted aimed at in the program of the governor-been the case in the past. That seems to be the elect and the result that will be accomplished if the program is adopted.

Unfinished Business

HAVE you any unfinished business? You have done only half the job when you buy tuberculosis Christmas Seals. To complete it, you should use the seals and use them early.

There is an important reason for this. The Christmas Seal in itself is a means of education. In the minds of the public, it has come to be identified with tuberculosis. Any one receiving mail to which is affixed the seal with the red double-barred cross immediately has his attention focused on this disease. Therefore, the wider the use of the seals, the more effectively will the campaign attain its purpose of eradicating tuberculosis.

This year, especially, the design of the Christmas Seal is unusually attractive. The mother and her two children in the charming costumes of the Victorian age, the candle-lighting ceremony and the double-barred cross of the tuberculosis movement combine admirably to make a charming bit of decoration for any card or package. And, certainly, they carry to humanity Christmas greetings of the highest possible significance.

Any campaign that has as its purpose the prevention of tuberculosis should have the backing of every person in the land. A visible evidence of this backing is the appearance of Christmas Seals on cards, letters and packages throughout the country.

The dramatic accomplishments in the fight against this disease are largely due to the fact that the Christmas Seal focuses at least for several weeks out of the year the attention of all citizens on tuberculosis. Today, every child has five times

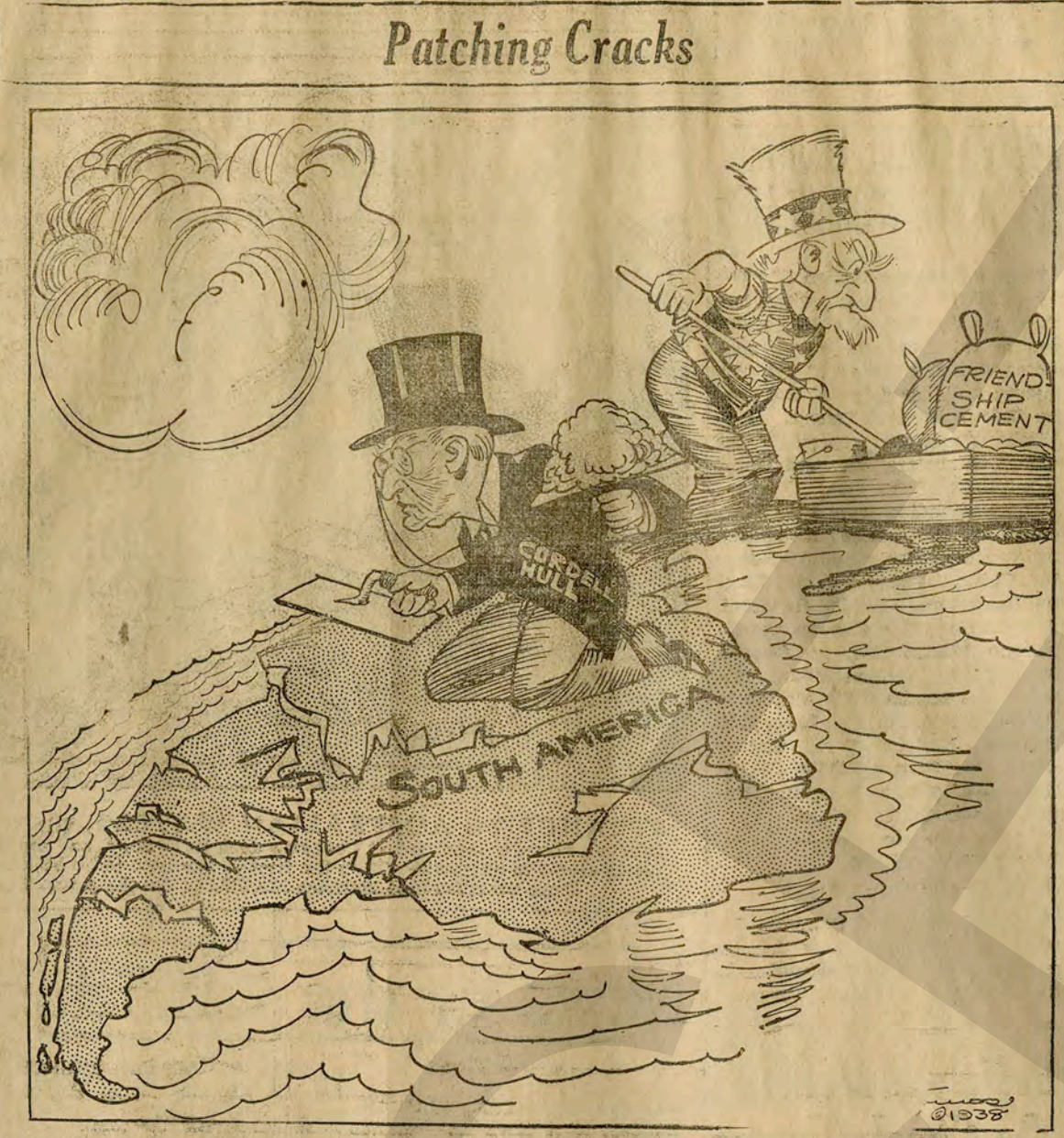

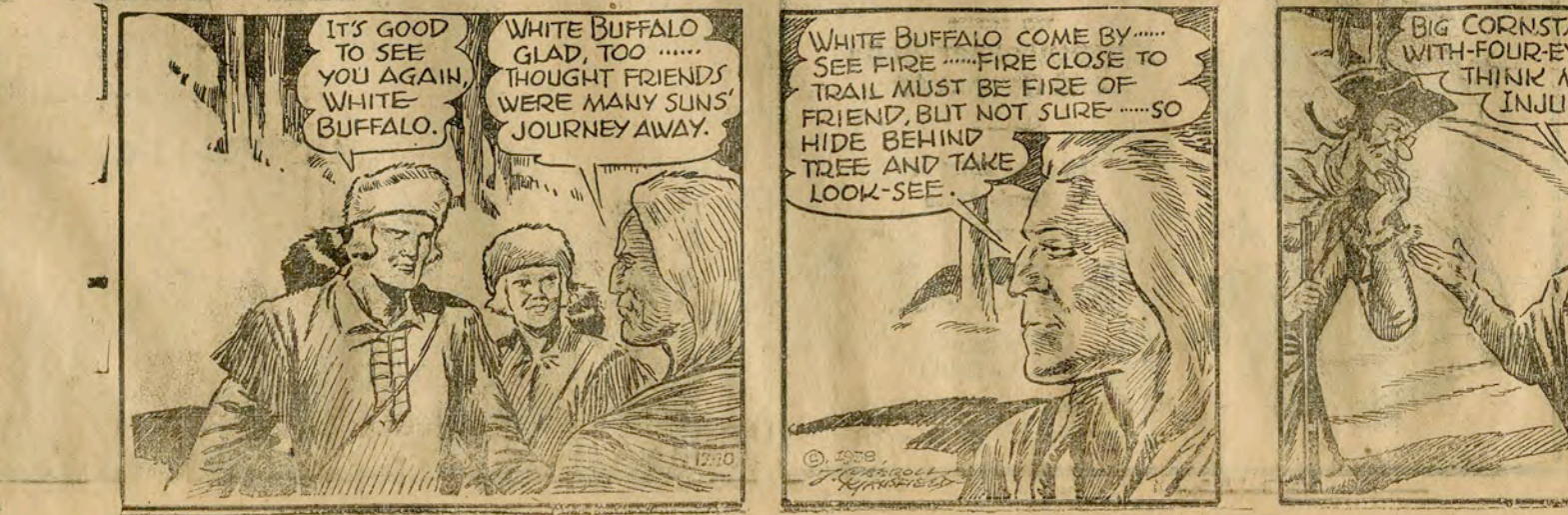

HIGH LIGHTS OF HISTORY



Washington Daybook

By Prest-a Grover

WASHINGTON — There is an amazing parallel of names and circumstances between the present political hour and 1912; and some possibility that the names and circumstances will continue parallel, or at least continue related.

In 1912 William Howard Taft was President and candidate for re-election. Now his son Robert Taft of Ohio, is freshly elected United States senator and suddenly given President glamor.

In 1912, Champ Clark of Illinois was speaker of the House and a Presidential aspirant who was defeated for his party's nomination by an abrupt last minute shift of votes to Woodrow Wilson. A generation later his son, Senator Bennett Champ Clark, is freshly re-elected and, like Taft, given Presidential glamor.

In those days an important left wing liberal was the elder Senator Bob LaFollette. Now his son young Bob has his place in the Senate as an important left wing liberal.

Rooseveltian Counterpart

In the White House is a Roosevelt, who, to a certain degree, had his counterpart in the earlier Theodore Roosevelt. The 1938 Roosevelt has just suffered some thing of a setback in his effort to build around him a solid liberal party. The earlier Roosevelt in 1912 made an even more exciting effort going to the extent of splitting the Republican party wide open, pulling the Progressive elements with him. It permitted election of Woodrow Wilson who drew a decided minority of the total popular vote.

Hitler Furnishes Parallel

In 1938, Fuehrer Hitler, dictator of a later Germany, is pushing toward the East, like Wilhelm who is demanding a place in the sun. He demands return of the colonies which Germany obtained years ago by Kaiser Wilhelm's bluff and bluster.

It is a great game, this parallel business, but should not be carried too far, nor should not much be read into it. Wisely or not, this country is presuming that within the next few years it will have to fight, or at least be ready to fight. No such thought troubled 1912 America. It rested secure in its feeling of complete isolation from foreign fighting—and built nothing for fighting or threatening.
