I was so happy to learn of your research project which will no doubt be a real contribution to Mexico and internationally.

with a direct criticism of the Algeman administration, but, of course, in a careful and tactful manner. I would point out, in your name, that in spite of his good intentions, efforts at industrialization, irrigation and other attempted improvements, it is none the less a retrogression, going back to Diaz, rather than advancing the march of the Revolution. Following your trend of thought, I would bring out what the philosophy of the Revolution should be, and in what sense Algeman and his administration discussed themselves from it. The "Crisis of Mexico" has its own momentum, but entering into Algeman's administration brings it up to date. The criticism -- of a rather friendly nature -- would be directed solely towards their mistaken philosophy, and towards pointing to a more constructive road.

The more I read Mexican history, the more I realize the soundness of your position and of what service it would be to Mexico. Perhaps we may realize one day Plato's Utopia where philosophers will become the rulers and the rulers will be philosophers.

Even though I am continually reminded of some writing commitment, I shall brush all aside and start on your article as soon as I hear from you. I wonder what you would mention among the constructive efforts or benefits of Alleman's administration. Is there any part of his program that could be commended by you? I am reluctant to burden you, knowing how busy you are, but I think a complete account of your views would be a real contribution.

We are gald glad indeed that Experience and Nature will be soon forthcoming. Our Committee would be delighted should you yourself find time to write to the translation. We take much pleasure in dedicating the volume to you, and I shall mail you the wording as soon as I present it to our Committee which will meet within less than a week. Professor Kilpatrick offered to write a brief Foreword, and this too will not take long, about a week or so.

Professor Dewey is spending his summer vacation in Canada. As soon as I hear from him I shall let you know whether or not we can expect that Prolegue. When I saw him before he left, he was busily engaged in an important major work. Some more honors were

bestowed upon him this spring. There is no American who received as many as he did during his long career.

I hope that Professor Jose Gaos is advancing steadily with his translation of the Logic and that he enjoys it as much as he did Experience and Nature. He told me how much he liked it and how congenial it is with his own way of thinking. It was hard to contact him, but I saw him for a few minutes at the University while I was visiting Professor Samuel Ramos. Professor Ramos too finds much inspiration in Art as Experience and he intends to finish the translation not later than the end of this summer.

I wish to tell you once more how fruitful and inspiring was to me my visit at your office, and how much I shall enjoy interpreting your thoughts. I hope you will find much pleasure in your new research project.



Dear Honorable Alfonso Reyes

On October 20 of this year the North American philosopher, Professor John Dewey will be 90 years of age. A Birthday Committee is actively at work to secure the appropriate celebration of the occasion. In the celebration stress will be given to democracy which has played so large a part in Professor Dewey's philosophy, and to the understanding and shaping of which he has made such significant contributions. We hope not to limit the celebration to the United States, but to enlist also the cooperation of other countries and so make the occasion a truly international celebration.

In the United States the birthday is being celebrated by a three day conference beginning with a large and representative dinner on October 20 to which President Truman is planning to send a congratulatory message. Participants in the conference will include General Dwight Eisenhower, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, and other outstanding figures. The universities, colleges, and public schools, will hold simultaneous meetings on the same day. The sponsoring committee includes Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Justices of the United States Supreme Court, United States Senators, governors, scholars, educators, (including such university presidents as Conant of Harvard, Seymour of Yale, Stassen of Pennsylvaia, Hutchins of Chicago, Bowman of Johns Hopkins), and many, many others. The Chairman of the Committee is Professor William H. Kilpatrick, one of the most outstanding educators, the one who applied Dewey's philosophy to education.

It has been suggested that friends of Professor Dewey in other countries will secure from their universities, learned societies, and governments, appropriate greetings and other specific recognition of Professor Dewey. Among the various suggestions made to us are greetings from government heads and outstanding people, honorary degrees, governmental honorary awards, conferences on the same day, articles and notices in the press, and the additional translation and publication of one of Professor Dewey's books.

We would especially appreciate your own greetings.

There is no meed for us to say anything about Professor Dewey's importance in the world. The Voice of America will celebrate the occasion; UNESCO will broadcast a special Dewey program in three languages. Regarding this, Director General Jaime Torres Bodet says that Professor Dewey is "one of the great figures of our age-one of the world's most noble and distinguished citizens. In honoring Professor Dewey your committee is honoring, and thereby helping to upheld, world civilization. Henry S. Commager, Professor of History at Columbia University, says, "Now that Franklin Delano Roosevelt and Justice Holmes are gone, Professor Dewey is, I suppose, without question our most distinguished citizen."

It is in the knowledge of your fine contribution to cultural interrelationships that we are prompted to write to you and hope that you will obtain the participation of your country in any way you see fit. We shall greatly appreciate anything that you may do to help us make the celebration a great international event, with Latin American as our most active and outstanding participant.

Should you wish to have some material we will be happy to furnish it to you.
