This routine of course does not prevent the proposal of change in a budget or of some other mode of payment than that in effect.

Dear Dr. Reyes:

By now you have seen enough of the way we work in Humanities for the Rockefeller Foundation to have some judgment of how we go about our business. It struck me yesterday that this is a favorable time to get personal comments from you, Caso, and Cosio Villegas. I know that you will realize I am not asking for commendation of what we have done, but instead for suggestions on the way our help can be of greatest advantage in Mexico or any other country in Central America. Specifically, are we missing highly important opportunities for international cooperation? The sum certainly will be modest and the reasons for action may hereafter be necessarily more compelling by reason of importance and immediate opportunity. Not that I see any slacking of our plans, because I have no foresight on future operations, but I think we should feel the two institutions aided by Humanities fairly stabilized through the period of support and still of real interest on important next stages for international work.

Dear Dr. Stevens:

We understand now that, quite apart from future plans of cooperation between your Foundation and both El Colegio and the Instituto, you want us to suggest some possible new fields for action by the Foundation.

As I told you in my last letter, Dr. Caso, Cosío Villegas and myself met to consider your letter, and we arrived to suggestions which may be presented as follows:

- 1) We had no doubt as to Mexico and Central America being rich fields for your endeavors, both because there are able people eager to embark themselves in serious work, and because poor resources make those plans to be put aside awaiting better times. Mr. Caso, for instance, mentioned the possibility of a new history of Mexico, a collective work in several volumes, in which specialists would be invited to write on their special fields or periods.
- 2) We all agreed, however, that although we could mention right now some promising plans of work, the wise thing would be first to make a survey of needs, people and institutions, so as to have a general view, as complete as possible, and then decide which projects would be more important and feasible. We felt strongly as to the need of making such a survey in Mexico and more so for Central America.
- 3) We also felt that if such a survey is to be made, you must pick out a person having full command of the Spanish language and pretty good idea of what the countries involved are; this is important, in fact, essential.
- 4) Finally, going as far as we could allow ourselves, we felt how much easier things would be if that person were a permanent representative of your Division of Humanities, stationed in Mexico and acting for Mexico and Central America. That person, you may be sure, can depend on us for whatever advise and information he would care to ask. We shall be quite willing to act in a more permanent advisory capacity if that is felt convenient.

All three wish you may find our suggestion of some interest and use, and if you want me go further on some special point, I am ready to write you again. In the meanwhile, as always,
