Dear Professor Rajan:

We would like to inform you that for twenty-two years there has existed in Mexico City a non-profit, private institution dedicated to higher education and to research work in the field of humanities and in some of the social sciences. Its name is El Colegio de México and it is directed by a group of well known personalities.

El Colegio de México has been publishing for thirteen years, besides its teaching and research activities, a hispanic, literary and philological reviews and a historical one, for ten years. It intends now to initiate a quarterly publication on international affairs.

This, of course, would be a periodical devoted to give to the Spanish speaking readers, that is to say, to Spain and to the nineteen Latin-American countries, a notion of their own international problems and of those of the main nations or regions of the world. These problems are not only juridical, but political, economic, social and cultural as well.

The review would have an initial section dedicated to the publication of articles, of an average length of 4,500 to 9,000 words, in which a particular subject or theme, the presentation of which could be of international interest, would be dealt with. It would have a book-review section and another of documents, where those which could have a notable international repercussion would be reproduced.

El Colegio de México intends to pay the contributions it publishes: it offers a fee of 40 American dollars for an article, and from 10 to 20 dollars for a book-review, according to its extent. El Colegio does not pretend to acquire through these payments exclusive literary rights, that is to say, in all languages, but only in the Spanish language. In this manner, the authors who write in a language other than the Spanish, would be free to use those same articles for publications in reviews or periodicals in their own language. In the same manner, if you are planning to deliver an article or book-review for a journal of your own language, you may order a carbon copy of it to be sent to us for consideration.

El Colegio de México would like to invite you most heartily to send a contribution, perhaps on some of the topics you usually cover in your courses. We would like you to consider yourself a permanent collaborator of this periodical so that you may send, without further invitation, those articles and book-reviews that may come from your

Dear President Villegas,

I feel ashamed that I did not promptly acknowledge your very kind letter of July extending me a standing invitation to contribute to your esteemed periodical. Partly because of tremendous pressure of work (for the last three years I have been engaged in preparing the mss. of India in World Affairs 1954-6) and partly due to the desire to send you a substantial article, I delayed replying to your letter, and I never anticipated that the delay would be as much as three months! I apologise for it!

A friend of mine in New York would be shortly mailing you an article by me entitled 'India's Role in Respect of the Suez and the Hungarian Questions'. The article is rather long -- 62 pages and some 20,000 words--and I suggest you use it in two instalments in two issues of your journal. It can easily be split into two at the end of the analysis of the Suez question, pp. 1-39. This article is substantially a part of the larger study I have made of India in World Affairs 1954-6 for publication under the auspices of the Indian Council of World Affairs, New Delhi. This is the third in the series of volumes of the title being published by the Council, on the same pattern as the volumes of the United States in World Affairs. But you do not need to take the permission of the Council for publishing the article; I shall take care of it.

After receipt of the article, please let me know if it suits your publication. From 1st November onwards, my address would be c/o Institute of Commonwealth Studies, University of London, London, WC 1. I shall be in England for a year.

On the basis of the terms mentioned in your letter, I would like to suggest that if the article is accepted I be offered an honorarium of US \$ 100 for the contribution, but I am willing to accept any reasonable figure suggested by you. I request that the money be paid to

me in England by draft on a London Bank. I hope you can arrange this.

If there is likely to be great delay between the receipt of the article and your decision on it, I would appreciate an immediate acknowledgement of the receipt of the article. Otherwise, you might convey me your decision promptly. If you decide not to use the article, I hope you will return the mss. to me.

Dear Mr. Rajan:

Thank you for your letter of October 11.

Please forgive my delay in acknowledging receipt of your article on India's attitude to the Suez and Hungarian - questions; but I have had it under consideration for some time in order to be able to make you a definite proposal in this letter.

We are certainly interested in publishing this - admirable explanation of your country's reactions and of her - conduct in the United Nations during those two periods. It does much to clarify India's philosophy as regards world affairs and will serve as a background of reference for her future role on the international scene.

However, I feel strongly that much of the impact of the article depends on its immediate comparison of the two - questions under discussion and that this would be lost if they appeared separately with a three month interval. We cannot, of course, publish so long an article in one issue and I have thought of the possibility of reducing the elaboration of certain facts, both in context and footnotes, always, naturally, conserving - their essence. In addition, because of its purely Latin roots, the Spanish language lends itself to some condensation of the complexities of English.

If this proposal is agreeable to you, please let us know so that we can begin work on translation as soon as possible. We would, then, like to send you the shorter Spanish version for your approval before publication.
