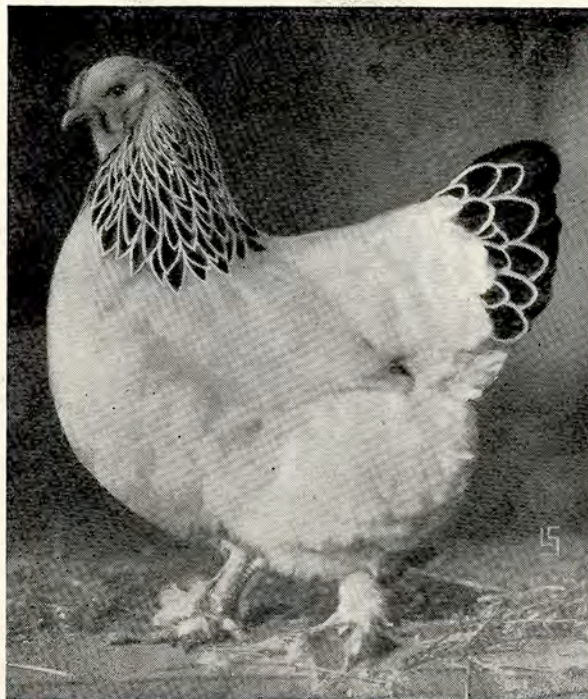

Flocks that average 150 to 175 eggs per bird are not unusual and if forced for egg production there is no doubt but that they would go 200 eggs or better. For farm flock or city lot there is no breed that can match the sterling worth of the time-honored, old Light Brahma.

### SHOW RECORD

A complete record of my "Gilt Edge" Light Brahmas, detailing their winnings during nearly a quarter of a century of exhibiting in America's leading shows, would require entirely too much space to include them in one small folder. Heart of America and Missouri State Show Combined, Kansas City, Mo., December, 1923. State Meet: Cock 1, 3, 4, 5; Hen, 1, 2, 3; Cockerel, 1, 2, 3, 4; Pullet, 1, 2, 3, 4; Old Pen, 1; Young Pen, 1; All State Association and Light Brahma Club Specials; all birds under ribbons but one. Second Cock was a bird I sold from my own yards two months before show!

Pike County Show, Bowling Green, Mo., Dec., 1923: Cock, 1, 2, 3, 4; Hen, 1, 2, 3, 4; Cockerel, 1, 2, 3, 4; Pullet, 1, 2, 3, 4; Old Pen 1, 2; Young Pen, 1, 2.

Missouri State Show and American Royal Shows combined, Kansas City, Nov., 1924: All my birds under ribbons, winning every prize competed for except third cockerel, and all Specials. The following week I exhibited the same string at Omaha, Nebraska, where we held our Sectional Club Meet for the third year in succession.

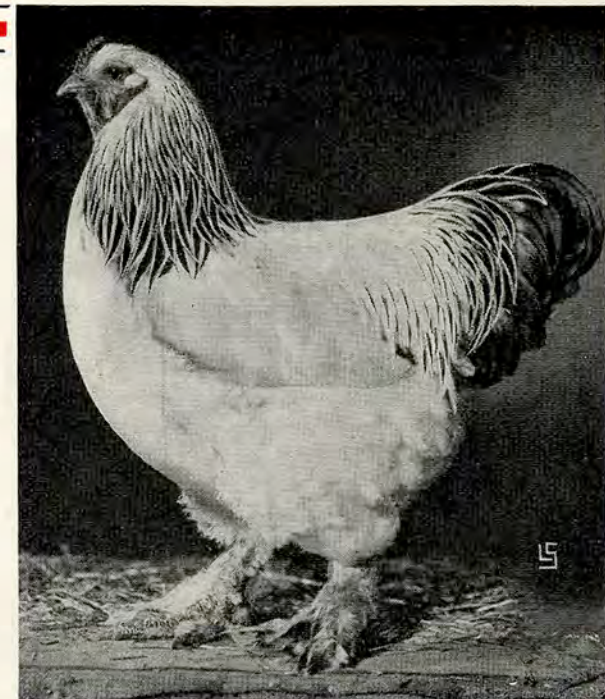

### How to Order

Orders for Eggs should be sent in early or booked for later date. I can ship eggs promptly if booked in advance and will do my best to fill rush orders immediately. If for any reason I can't fill them on or near the date requested, I will notify you and refund your money or fill the order at a later date.

All eggs shipped by insured parcel post prepaid unless otherwise instructed. Express shipments are sent collect. 75% fertility guaranteed. Eggs should be tested on tenth day and if there is any dissatisfaction in regard to fertility, the infertile or clear eggs can be packed in the basket they were shipped in and returned to me for adjustment. Do not attempt to test Brahma eggs under TEN days and do not return dead embryos from your incubator to be replaced as infertile eggs.
