Dr. Javid Iqbal, a good friend of mine, and Dr. K.W. Thompson, of the Rockefeller Foundation, have suggested that I should be in contact with you. I take pleasure in writing this letter, which contains and invitation, one that I hope you will be able to accept.

El Colegio de México is a small, private institute, devoted to teaching and advanced research in the Social Sciences and the Humanities. It has now inaugurated a Center for the Advanced Study of International Relations.

The Center will train a limited group of students, well selected and with a sufficient command of English to easily follow lecturers in said language, write papers and fully participate in seminar discussions. The financial assistance of Unesco, the Organization of American States and the Rockefeller Foundation have made possible not only the Center's establishment but the planning of its work as a truly and valid academic enterprise. Under separate cover I am sending you some copies of the Quarterly on International Affairs that our Center started almost a year ago. I am enclosing herewith a bulletin in which the Center's purposes and aims are set forth.

For the Academic Year of 1963, from February to June inclusive ly, the Center is offering a Course on "India Today". Previous Ty, our students should have received, from Dr. B.B. Misra of D.A.U. College, a course on "The Indian Culture". We wish you to consider our invitation to take charge of such a course. You will be free to set the limits of your lectures and we will gladly purchase those books you feel are necessary for them. We have planned on two hours (three if you prefer) of lectures a week, plus that extra work that you feel necessary for the improvement of your course. Some public lectures of an occasional nature will also take place.

The terms of our invitation will cover your transportation, travelling expenses, plus a stipend for a five month period of a thousand dollars per month. I will be of course only too willing to provide further information if you so desire it.

I hope you will forgive me for not replying sooner to your letter of the 20th February. Please be assured that this is not on account of any lack of interest in the contents of your letter but rather because I was hoping to be able to give you a firm answer when replying.

I very much regret, however, that this is not yet possible. I am definitely interested in your extremely kind invitation and wish with all my heart that it were possible for me to accept at once. Unfortunately too much depends on whether or not a tentative invitation which I have received from the United States for 1962 matures or not. I fear that if I go to America next year I shall be unable to visit Mexico also in the year following. I will try to ascertain the position regarding the American invitation as soon as possible and will write to you as promptly as I can. I do very much apologise for creating uncertainty - the more so since you were so considerate as to give me plenty of notice in making your invitation.

In the meantime it might be helpful if you could at your convenience let me have a little further information on two points. First, I wonder whether any shorter period than the whole semester from February to June inclusive would be acceptable to you. As you know our terms in England run from January to the end of March and from the beginning of May to the end of June. Your present proposal would involve my absence during practically the whole of two of our three terms. This would probably be much more difficult than a shorter period from say the middle of March until early June, for in the case of this shorter period I should be able to do the bulk of my teaching in Durham and also be home in time to examine in the second half of June.

Second. I should be interested to know whether in your view the stipend and expenses which you mention would be sufficient to cover the cost of having my family (wife and two children) accompanying me to Mexico.

Hoping to hear from you include course and hoping for my part to be able to give you a satisfactory reply later,

Thank you for your kind letter of 17th April.

The tentative invitation from the United States which I mentioned in my previous letter has now become definite and I have accepted the position of Visiting Professor at Chicago for March-June, 1962. I fear that this now makes a 5 months visit to Mexico in 1963 impossible for me. I agree that July-November is easier than February-June because July-September is in any case our long vacation. But October and November still mean the greater part of the term; for this, leave would be required. I would not feel able to ask for leave in 1963 having taken it already in 1962.

Therefore while I quite understand your request that the stay should be for 5 months I can only say that such a period must for the present rule me out. If you feel that I could be of assistance for a shorter period in connection with perhaps part of your India course, I would be happy to consider it. Since I shall already be in America in 1962, it might be more economical if such a period were contemplated for that year, say sometime between July and September. On the other hand, it is probable that you are restricted to invitations for the full Semester.

You have been very generous and thoughtful in framing the invitation and it is for that reason with special regret that I have to respond in this mainly negative fashion.

I did not continue the correspondence we had during last year because our own plans were very uncertain. Thank you for your letter of the 26th October.

I am sorry to learn that my syllabus has been mislaid, but fortunately I think I have a copy of the document which I sent to Dr. Cuevas Cancino from Chicago during my period there earlier this year. This document already indicates by asterisks the books I consider of particular importance and I would say that it would be desirable to have perhaps between six and twelve copies of each of these books. However I think that in the case of some of these it may not be easy to find copies readily available certainly not in the case, for example, of the 1918/1930 official Government Reports mentioned on page 4. I can only hope that the library will make an effort to have at least one copy available. Two of the books I have asterisked are now available as paperbacks, that by Brecher on Nehru, and by Palmer entitled Indian Political System. I should think that the students might be expected to purchase these themselves and perhaps copies can be made available for that purpose.

I agree with you that arrangements for travel and accommodation can be made a little nearer the time. Of course I have no idea of the accommodation problems in Mexico City and it may be useful if I mention at this early stage (a) that the family consists of myself, my wife and three small children, and (b) that we would wish if possible (and if you consider it advisable) to rent a furnished flat or apartment, preferably with some garden, rather than stay in a hotel. Of course the advisability of this would depend partly on how readily house help and/or help with children is available but I would expect that there should not be much difficulty about this in Mexico City. I shall be quite interested to have your views on this some time.

Thank you very much for your letter of the 5th of November with which you kindly sent us again the syllabus for your course.

I have seen your syllabus and I found it very interesting and explicative. Perhaps the only important comment that I think is pertinent for me to do in this respect, is to inform you that the group of students with which you will be working here, has already taken a course on Indian History covering both, the pre-colonial and the colonial period. However, let me add that it is up to you to consider if is advisable to concentrate your course in the contemporary problems of India. This seems reasonable since your residence in our College will cover only a period of three months. But I repeat, Sir, this is a matter for you to decide, because it is you the one who best know the needs of the course.

With respect to the arrangements for your accomodation in Mexico, let me tell you that I think it is advisable for you to rent a furnished apartment rather than to stay in a hotel, particularly since you have three small children. On the other hand, house help is ready available and non expensive in Mexico, although it will be necessary for Mrs. Morris-Jones to begin practicing her Spanish. Thank you for your letter of the 16th November. I quite agree with the point you make regarding the need to concentrate my course on contemporary political problems and it is possible that the outline I sent you does exaggerate the amount of time that I would wish to give to the historical background. Nevertheless in spite of the students having already taken a course on Indian history I should wish to go over some aspects of the pre-1947 period from the point of view of a political scientist. There are many questions which historians do not normally pose which I think are worth while discussing. I would not be intending to convey information but rather to indicate certain features of India's past which are continuously relevant to her present politics.

Thank you for your note about accommodation. I shall be glad to hear from you in due course about the cost of renting furnished apartments and I should also be glad to know what help the College can give in actually finding and negotiating arrangements for the rent; after all this is something which will have to be completed before we arrive and I do not know how I could really do this from a distance. I have passed to my wife your advice about Spanish; as she comes herself from Italy she anticipates less difficulty than others might have but she nevertheless is taking proper steps to make herself proficient in the language.



Thank you for your letter of the 8th of February.

I think that I have found the solution for your problem of housing in Mexico City. This is the house where Professor Richard Solberg -our guest in American History for this Semester- is staying at the present time.

The house is as follows: 1) a two-floor furnished apartment (of a duplex divided vertically); 2) with a garden; 3) three bedrooms plus a living and a dining rooms; 4) one full bath room plus another half bath room. 5) Located not far from an English-Speaking kindergarten (that it has besides bus service). The rent of this apartment is of 240 american dollars per month. It includes lilinen, silver dishes and cook utensils. It does not cover gas and electricity, but these are not expensive in Mexico. My own guess is that you would have to pay around 15 dollars for both monthly.

I have spoken to Professor Solberg about you and he has told me that he would be very Pleased in informing you about his own personal experience with the house. So please feel free to write him if you think this will help you. His adress is the same of El Colegio de Mexico.



Although I come to Mexico in order to talk about India, I am very interested to make use of my stay for the purpose of studying Mexican politics and government. It would be very helpful if you could mention a few book titles which you think might serve as an introduction to that subject for me.

I note what you say about air tickets and I look forward to receiving these along with advice about visa arrangements.





Dear Dr. Gomez,

In confirmation of my telegram of yesterday I write to say that the names of my wife and children are as follows: Graziella Bianca Morris-Jones (wife); Rosanna Sylvia Morris-Jones, 7 (daughter); Frances Julia Morris-Jones, 5 (daughter); Stephen David Morris-Jones, $1\frac{1}{2}$ (son). It occurs to me that you may need and not have my own Christian names. They are Wyndraeth Humphreys.

I have been wondering recently what kind of arrangements you have in mind for the teaching of the course. If you would prefer these to be left until I arrive this would be perfectly acceptable to me, but it occurs to me that a timetable may require to be prepared before then and I would be glad to know what you would have in mind to propose. What I would myself choose would be two periods weekly each of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, allowing ample time in each period for an exchange of views, discussion and questions as well as straight lecturing. In addition there should be a period set aside - e.g. 2 hours one afternoon - when I can be free to talk to the students individually about written work or special problems, and this period could occasionally be used for a kind of class discussion centring around a student's written paper. It would probably be of some convenience to me if these three allocations of time could be as far as possible in the middle of the week - say Tuesday and Wednesday or Wednesday and Thursday.

I believe you mentioned that the students attending the course would already have done work in Indian history and culture. In that case I would be quite happy to have the students informed at once of their first essay assignment - provided of course that you think this is suitable and in conformity with your practice. They might be asked to have the essay ready for me by the time I arrive in early July. I would propose that they choose one of the following subjects and write an essay of approximately 2,000 words:

either (1) What importance, if any, do you attach to the study of a country's history as a preliminary to the study of its political system? Is the importance greater or less in the case of a "new state" such as India than in the case of an old state such as Britain?

or (2) How far have you discerned themes in Indian history which appear to be relevant to an understanding of modern Indian politics?

If the number of students attending the course is not too large it would be possible for me to have a look at these essays soon after reaching Mexico and on that basis to form an opinion of the students' capabilities. However, I leave this matter entirely to your discretion and I will understand very well if you find the proposal inappropriate.







Dear Mario,

It is now exactly two weeks since I landed back in England; it doesn't seem so long because I had the impression that I had been talking almost continuously since I arrived about Mexico in general and about El Colegio in particular!

I wanted to write to you to say how very much all of us enjoyed our stay in Mexico and to thank you on behalf of us all for your very great contribution to our happiness. I really think that El Colegio is doing great work and is an institution with a fine future. I very much hope that we can keep in touch.

At the Oxford meeting of the Executive Committee of the International Political Science Association I reported my discussions with you about the possible formation of a Mexican Political Science Association and the Executive Committee expressed considerable interest and enthusiasm. They fully endorsed your sentiments, as reported by me, to the effect that no attempt should be made to construct an association with undue speed and consequent unreality. I gave your name and address to the Secretary General, Monsieur Hurtig (27, Rue Saint-Guillaume, Paris 7°) and he told me that he would be getting in touch with you to give particulars of the International Association and of next September's Geneva Congress in particular. The Executive Committee could see no objection to Mexico being represented by observers at this Congress.

Also at Oxford I met Professor Taylor Cole, Provost of Duke University, U.S.A., where there is the Commonwealth Studies Centre which I mentioned to you. (By the way this Duke University Commonwealth Studies Centre now has an imposing list of about twenty substantial publications; it would be worth while getting the library to get the complete list from them with a view to ordering a good many of them.) Knowing Cole to be a man closely in touch with Commonwealth specialists everywhere and in Canada especially,

I asked him if any names of suitable visiting professors for El Colegio occurred to him. He was able to be most helpful and mentioned two people in particular as being quite outstanding: John Holmes, Director of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs at Toronto, and Professor Frank Scott, Dean of the Law School at McGill University, Montreal. Cole said that my suggestion of Underhill was of course excellent but that Underhill, although a most lively and stimulating person, had of late not been enjoying good health and might be reluctant to take on a visit. Holmes and Scott on the other hand were described to me by Cole as men of comparable quality, much younger and full of vigour and intellectual power. I hope that this information will be of some use to you.

As I was preparing to write this letter to you I received a note from Fuentes asking me to supply him with an appropriate letter for use with McGill University; I have replied to him saying that I would be glad to write directly to McGill on his behalf.

I look forward to hearing news one of these days from our young Soviet specialist and his German wife.

My wife joins me in sending greetings to you and your family and I would ask to be remembered to all my friends at El Colegio.

Speaking frankly Sir, you were indeed very generous to us because your work was done always with a great spirit of cooperation going much further from the obligations you were comitted to. This is the case, for instance, of the council and advise we received from you during the visit of Mr. Malcom Adiseshiah from UNESCO. Thank you very much.

I want to thank you also for presenting our case to the Executive Committee of the International Political Science Association at the Oxford Meeting. I am glad to see that these gentlemen consider our case interesting and are agreable to our ideas of proceeding slowly in the formation of a Mexican association, and of sending an observer to the Geneva Congress next year. I hope to have news soon from the Secretary General, Mr. Hurting, as you anounce me in your letter.

Let me inform you at this respect, that I have talked to Dr. Pablo González Casanova on the matter once more, and that he is very enthusiastic with the idea. As for Dr. Daniel Cosío Villegas, I did not have the chance to speak to him on the matter, since he has gone to New York forming part of our Delegation to the General Assembly of the United Nations. However, I am going to write to him soon and consult his opinion.

I am taking note of professors John Holmes and Frank Scott as suitable candidates for our project of bringing a Canadian scholar next year. In due time I shall submit the eir names to the Canadian Universities Foundation, that is the

institution which with we have made contact for this matter. Thank you very much once more.
