Dear Sir;-

In reference to reported prospective changes in the personnel of the Governors of the Mexican border States, I trust it is not amiss to write you in regard to Governor Cantu. I have been a resident of California for over thirty years and have large interests in the Imperial Valley, so that I have had opportunity to come in contact more or less directly with Governor Cantu. It is my sincere belief that in the administration of the affairs of his office he has striven for fairness and justice and has endeavored to promote good feeling between the two countries, and to co-operate with the American authorities for peace and good understanding along the border while upholding the dignity of his own country.

Speaking unofficially, as a plain American citizen, I can not resist assuring you that Governor Cantu's term in office has helped materially to bring about good feeling along the border, and that his retention in office, (if it is in line with the ideas of the Mexican Government, ) can not fail to give satisfaction and pleasure to residents on both sides of the line.
