Dear Dr. Cosío Villegas:

Austin College will offer a course in contemporary Mexico in January, 1968. Approximately thirty students and two instructors will travel to Mexico City where the course will be conducted. During the four weeks, we will consider four topics, which we feel will give the students a feeling of Mexico today: politics, religion, economics, and domestic life. I will direct the course, discussing the various topics in lectures, then taking the students on guided tours of the city and surrounding areas to illustrate the various topics under consideration. As a culminating activity in each study, we hope to have a Mexican authority on the subject deliver a lecture, conduct a discussion, etc. so the students will get more than our opinions. They will get, we hope, the reasoned conclusions of an expert and a Mexican.

We would be extremely honored if you could deliver an hour lecture to our group, to help climax the first week's activity, on "The Status of the Revolution Today," or some similar topic of your choosing. We would be delighted to have you speak to us, whether during the first two weeks of January, of during the latter part of the month if your schedule does not permit such an appointment early. Of course, there will be a small honarium.

We certainly understand that you may be previously engaged and not able to speak to us. If this is the case, could you recommend one of your colleagues who might be able to aid us. First, however, the invitation is extended to you. We have students from both Texas and Florida schools in our group—students who are very interested in Mexico today, and I will appreciate any help that you can give me in making their month's stay in Mexico as profitable as possible.
