Dear Professor Greaves:

As far as I remember, you must be back by now at your London work, having finished at Columbia by the end of January, I presume.

I was indeed sorry for having such a limited chance to talk with you at El Colegio de México where to the young Prietos took you one afternoon. After all we Mexicans rarely meet English professors in these days.

I am sending to your personal address some of the books on the Mexican political side published by El Colegio, my own on the 1857 liberal Constitution and perhaps I will decide to inflict you with the first volume of the Modern History of Mexico, dealing also with the political life of the country from 1867 to 1876.

You may remember that I told you about El Colegio's plans to start a quarterly on international affairs next July. We have not invited so far any English people due mainly because we have not on hand the catalogues of, say, London, Cambridge and Oxford universities. But I remember that when we talked about potential English contributors to our journal you made some interesting remarks as to the groups working on the political science field, and the international relations proper.

I would like then to ask you the favor of giving me, say, some five names and addresses of those you consider the nearest to our needs and purposes.
