Dear Dr. Schartz:

Having heard of our idea of starting a journal on internacional affairs, The Rockefeller Foundation gave us your name as that of an American scholar with broad interests in modern politics and in international relations, who might be willing to collaborate with us.

El Colegio de México is a non-profit, private institution in Mexico City which has dedicated itself to higer education and to research work in the field of humanities and some of the social sciences, for the past twenty-two years. It is directed by a group of personalities of the Mexican intellectual world, and has been publishing, besides its teaching and research activities, a hispanic, literary and philological review for thirteen years, and a historical one for ten years. It intends now to inciate a quarterly publication on international affairs.

This, of course, would be a periodical devoted to give to the Spanishspeaking readers, that is to say, to Spain and to the nineteen LatinAmerican countries, a notion of their own international problems and of
those of the main nations or regions of the world. These problems are
not only juridical, but political, economic, social and cultural as well.

The review would have an initial section dedicated to the publication of articles, of an average length of 4,500 to 9,000 words, in which a particular subject of theme, the presentation of which could be of international interest, would be dealt with. It would have a book-review section and another of documents, where those which could have a notable international repercussion would be reproduced.

El Colegio de Mexico intends to pay the contributions it publishes: it offers a fee of 40 American dollars for an article, and from 10 to 20 dollars for a book-review, according to its extent. El Colegio does not pretend to acquire through these payments exclusive literary rights, that is to say, in all languages, but only in the Spanish language. In this manner, the authors who write in a language other than the Spanish, would be giree to use those same articles for publications in periodicals in their own tongue.

El Colegio de Mexico would like to invite you most heartily to send a contribution before the second week of May 1960, for we hope to bring forth next June or July the first number of the review. We wish you to consider yourself a permanent collaborator of our quarterly, so that you may send, without further invitation, those articles or book-reviews that may come forth from your usual work, with the certainty that they will be most welcomed and published in our periodical. You may sure about our translation into Spanish as we are very mucho used to this work.

El Colegio de Mexico would also appreciate very mucho if you could indicate to us the name and address of friends or colleagues of yours, whom you consider liable to be interested in cooperating with us.

El Colegio de México is a small, private institute, devoted to teaching and advanced research in the Social Sciences and the Humanities. It has now inaugurated a Center fot the Advanced Study of International Relations.

The Center will train a limited group of students, well selected, and with a sufficient command of English to easily follow lecturers in said language, write papers and participate in Seminar discussions. The financial assistance of the Rockefeller Foundation, of the O.A.S. and of Unesco have made possible not only the Center's establishment, but the planning of its work as a truly and valid academic enterprise.

I am sending you under separate cover some copies of the Quarterly on International Affairs that our Center started almost a year ago; and a bulletin in which we tried to set forth the Center's purposes and aims, is enclosed.

For the Academic year of 1963, from July to November, inclusively, the Center is offering a Course on "The Central Peoples's Republic of China". Previously, the students will have, in 1962, a course on Sino-Japanese Culture, that we hope will be delivered by professor Yamamoto.

We wish you to consider our invitation to take charge of such a course. You will be free to set your own limits, ans we will gladly purchase those books you feel are necessary for it. We have planned on three (perhaps two) hours of lectures a week, plus that extra work you might feel indispensable for the improvement of your Course. Some public lectures of an occasional nature will also take place. The terms of our invitation will cover your transportation, and a stipend for a five month perior of a thousand dollars per month. I will be of course only too willing to provide further information if you so desire.

We have been in correspondence in the past. But due to your visit to the Far East, last year, various letters seem to have been mislaid. I am taking therefore the advantage of the presence of Mr. Nother Thrauth in your University -through the kindness of Miss Josefina Vázquez- to send you the present letter.

My first letter, dated 17 of February last, explained to you the purposes and meaning of the Center of International Studies and giave a brief outline of what our purposes were. I also explained the desire of our Center to concentrate on non-Western cultures, and the previous course that will be offerd this year on Sino-Japanese Culture, that will be in the hands of Dr. Kazuo Enoki, of the University of Tokio. It was on this account that I made an invitation to you: to take charge of the course on "The Central People's Republic of China", that will be offered in 1963. I added that the Center could offer a stipend of five thousand dollars for the semester (either February to June, or July to November, according to what suits you most), plus two round way tickets for yourself and Mrs. Schwartz.

You were so kind as to reply from Hong-kong, on 29 March. You expressed you willingness to come to Mexico, but expressed some doubts regarding the lack of coincidence of our academic years. To this I replied on 18 May, addressing myself to the International House at Tokio, and expressing our willingness to consider any suitable changes. But it happens that this man said that at the same time you ought some money to him since he had to do some arrangements to the apartment during your stay in México for the following concepts: the lock of one door and the lavatory of the bathroom.
