El Gob. Tomás Garrido de Tabasco, Méx., pone el V.B. a -
la Región.

Tomás Garrido, Gobernador del E. de Tabasco, y Sena
dor electó por el mismo Estado, hizo una visita espe-
cial a la Feria del Este del Estado de Texas anoche, e-
informalmente fué invitado al banquete que tuvo lugar -
en el Beaumont Club, al que asistieron varios prominen-
tes hombres de negocios, en su mayoría consignatarios,-
interesados en el comercio con México y la América del-
Sur, y en el desarrollo industrial internacional entre-
los Continentes Norte y Sud-Americanos.

J. C. Clemmons, maestro de ceremonias, le dió la --
bienvenida al distinguido huesped y Enrique Mexía, agre-
gado al consulado de Nueva Orleans, y a cuyo cargo está
la exposición mexicana en la Feria del Estado de Texas,
presentó al Gobernador Garrido.

El Gobernador no escatimó elogios para Beaumont, y-
expresó sus agradecimientos por las atenciones que le -
han dispensado, no solo en Beaumont sino de todo el Es-
tado de Texas.

También para la Feria tuvo grandes elogios; y va-
riando el tema un poco, habló de los maravillosos recur-
sos de su propio Estado el que, aseguró a sus atentos -
oyentes, es riquísimo en Minerales, en productos agrí-
colas y en ganadería.

SE HACEN NECESARIAS UNAS RELACIONES MAS INTIMAS

El Gobernador Garrido declaró que había venido expresamente a Beaumont a ver la Feria con el fin de darle mayor desarrollo a su Estado.

"Nosotros no podemos, por ahora, desarrollar nuestros propios recursos, y, naturalmente, buscamos las grandes empresas, particularmente en esta región, para que nos ayuden," dijo, y aseguró a todos los presentes que, a todos los americanos que vayan a Tabasco se les tratará con la misma cordialidad con que él ha sido tratado en los Estados Unidos, y que tabasco les daría todas las facilidades posibles y que resultaran en el progreso mutuo de ambas naciones.

Su discurso fué interpretado o traducido por Harry-Gordon de la Compañía Hall Shipping de Beaumont y de Lake Charles.

Edmundo L. Aragón, cónsul mexicano radicado en Beaumont, habló sobre las relaciones amistosas que existen entre México y los Estados Unidos y expresó el deseo de llegar a una mejor inteligencia todavía. Enrique Mexía, fué su intérprete.

El Alcalde J. Austin Barnes también le dió la bienvenida al Gobernador Garrido haciéndolo objeto de toda clase de atenciones. 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EL GOBERNADOR DE TABASCO, QUIEN NOS VISITA AHORA,
AFIRMA QUE NO ES CULPABLE DE LOS ATROPELLLOS DE QUE LO
ACUSA 'LIBERTY.'

El Gobernador Tomás Garrido, de Tabasco, México, —
fué huesped bien impresionado ayer de la Feria del Sur-
del Estado de Texas, y ha prometido que el año entrante
habrá una exposición particular de su Estado en Beau-
mont, acompañada de una banda de música. Beaumont ha —
hecho ya muchas remesas al puerto de Frontera, capital-
del Estado de Tabasco y el Gobernador Garrido declara —
que el arreglo de las relaciones de puerto, favorable a
los puertos de Texas traerá consigo el que en lo futuro
se mantenga un servicio constante entre Beaumont y Fron-
tera.

"Nosotros necesitamos," dijo anoche, "maderas, pro-
ductos para una casa empacadora, maquinaria, harina y —
muchos otros artículos de los que ustedes exportan, y —
creemos que mucho de nuestro sisal, caoba, ébano y algu-
nas otras de nuestras maderas, vendrán muy pronto a los
mercados de Estados Unidos por este puerto. Anterior-
mente, nos habíamos limitado hasta cierto punto a Nueva
Orleans que tiene el monopolio de este comercio en mu-
chos de los países Centro y Sud-Americanos como también
de México."

LEYO QUE LO ATACABA UN MAGAZINE.

Fué ayer, mientras estaba en Beaumont, que el Gober-
nador Garrido leyó la agresión hecha en su contra en la

edición del 20 de noviembre de "LIBERTY", expresión en forma de magazine del "Chicago Tribune." Sidney Sutherland está escribiendo para este magazine una serie de cartas de México y en esta semana hace una grave acusación en contra del Gobernador Garrido. Sutherland escribe:

"Por ejemplo: sentí curiosidad por enterarme de las espantosas condiciones en que se encuentra el pantanoso Estado de Tabasco, situado en la curva inferior del Golfo de México. Quería saber por qué Tomás Garrido, joven Gobernador de aquel Estado, consiguió permiso para escaparse, cuando estaba positivamente acusado de asesinato en sus transacciones con el comercio y con la Iglesia.

"Garrido, según me dijeron, se vanagloriaba de que él mismo, personalmente, había dispuesto de cincuenta enemigos, amarrándoles trozos pesados de hierro al cuerpo y arrojándolos ^{vivos} al mar, donde los tiburones acabaron con ellos.

Ninguna persona, que yo sepa, ha negado jamás esta terrible historia, y no pude interrogar a Garrido, porque en la refriega que hubo hace dos o tres días en la inmensa puerta de mi posada, el Hotel Iturbide, ubicado en la principal avenida de la capital, y en la que hubo tres muertos y cinco heridos, el joven gobernador resultó herido y puede haber muerto ya para cuando leas esta carta, y eso le pondrá fin a la historia.

Garrido era toda una checa rusa. Tenía su artícu-

lo 33 especial para echar fuera de Tabasco a las personas que le eran desagradables. El Art. 33 de la Constitución Federal le permite al Presidente expulsar como pernicioso a cualquier extranjero cuya presencia le es odiosa. Pero la nacionalidad le era indiferente a Garrido y lo mismo desterraba extranjeros que nacionales, de sus fronteras.

Una vez, entró un General llamado Urbina, a una tienda de Frontera, capital del Estado, y preguntó el precio de las estufas de petroleo. Cuando le dijeron que valían cuarenta pesos se puso a blasfemar de una manera terrible, el dependiente, un joven mexicano que estaba para casarse, le explicó cortésmente que en otras partes eran más baratas, pero que debido a los impuestos decretados por el Gobernador a ellos les era imposible venderlas a menos precio. Se fué el General, y una hora después, el dependiente fué llevado a la frontera y abandonado en los bosques del Estado de Chiapas con la orden de no volver jamás a Tabasco, pues estaba acusado de sedición. No sé decirte que pasaría con su novia.

Garrido también interpretaba a su manera las cláusulas del código federal de 1917, referentes a la Iglesia y decretó una ley estipulando que ningún sacerdote o ministro podía officiar si no era mexicano de nacimiento y casado (i) Este reglamento dió por resultado, como era de suponerse, el éxodo de la vasta mayoría de los sacerdotes católicos, entre ellos el Obispo Pascual Díaz, prelado de pura sangre indígena, de cuerpo macizo,

tez morena, y de una inteligencia espléndida. Ahora es secretario y la mano derecha del anciano arzobispo de esta capital. El anciano está muriéndose de debilidad senil y de angustia."

La apariencia bondadosa de Garrido parece desmentir la sed de sangre que le atribuye Sutherland. Le ha enviado a J. Medill Patterson, editor de "Liberty y empleado prominente del "Chicago Tribune, una oferta:

LA OFERTA DEL GOBERNADOR.

El Gobernador Garrido ofrece depositar en un Banco nombrado por el "Chicago Tribune", una cantidad suficiente de dinero para pagar los gastos de investigación, siempre que el "Chicago Tribune" o cualquier otro periódico de reputación deposite una suma igual. Si la investigación prueba que Garrido fué de algún modo responsable de la muerte de los cincuenta individuos (que Sutherland asegura que fueron arrojados al mar con pesos de plomo atados al cuerpo) el Gobernador pagará todos los gastos, pero si no es así, los gastos se pagarán del depósito del "Chicago Tribune."

Refiriéndose a los otros cargos que se le hacen, el Gobernador Garrido dice que el General Ramón Urbina era del norte de México y que murió mucho antes de que la ley a que hacen referencia fuera aprobada, y que dicho General nunca estuvo en Tabasco.

Dice que el Obispo Pascual Díaz salió de Tabasco mucho antes de que se decretara la ley que obligaba a los sacerdotes a casarse.

"Yo no puedo evitar la propaganda que circula en los Estados Unidos en contra de mi país," dijo Garrido, --- "pero sí sé que nosotros no restringimos las creencias ni prácticas religiosas de nadie. En México hay más libertad hoy que nunca y espero que algunos de los hom---bres de negocios de Beaumont puedan ir alguna vez a Tabasco a conocer aquella parte del país y a darse cuenta de lo ansiosos que estamos de hacer negocios entre nuestro puerto de Frontera y el puerto de Beaumont."

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Scholastic Requirements For Athletics To Feature Mississippi School Meet

High Standards For Students To Be Maintained.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 15.—Requirements for members of athletic teams and regularity of absences brought into the spotlight at the annual meeting of the Mississippi Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools when that body assembled here on November 14 for a four-day session.

The tendency in the association has been to uphold high standards for athletes and to restrict absences to a minimum. Prof. J. Reese of Millsaps college said in discussing this phase of the meeting. The professor considered action to enforce regular attendance as probable at the coming meeting.

The 71 colleges and 12 secondary schools from 17 southern states will come to Jackson as guests of Millsaps and Mississippi although all members of the association are invited. Reservations for 250 delegates and 100 visitors and officials are expected. An attendance of 350 is estimated.

One of the main problems of the association is to speed action as much as possible on the many problems arising from the four-day session. Following the meeting the commission on colleges and the commission on secondary schools will meet on November 20 in order to present definite plans before the general meeting of the association in the morning of December 4.

All problems will be thoroughly thrashed out by the commissions before being called to the attention of the general session. Two full days will be taken up in the morning with the commissions holding separate sessions to consider the problems of their groups.

The commission on colleges, headed by Dean H. D. Chapman of Washington and Lee University, permanent chairman, will take up the much-discussed problem of the scholastic requirements for members of college athletic teams and are expected to have definite recommendations for presentation before the general meeting. Dr. J. Reese of the University of Mississippi is secretary of the commission.

MEMBERSHIP'S SIGHT
A number of new institutions at higher learning have filed membership applications with the association and these will be placed before the commission at the opening of the meeting. Practically all of the standard literary schools of the south are now members, but a few of the technical schools have not yet joined. PICTURES TELL SPANISH NEWS

Newspapers Throughout Nation Are Heavily Illustrated

MADRID, Nov. 17.—Pictures convey the "news" to a large proportion of Spain's population.

Most of the newspapers in this country carry illustrations as they have discovered it is the only way to reach a people in mass quantities. Overwhelmingly illiterate, as for instance in Spain, where 75 per cent cannot read or write.

GROW LIKE MUSHROOMS
Madrid, like the other cities of Spain, is well supplied with newspapers. With a population of approximately 800,000, it once had 40 daily newspapers, 20 morning and 20 evening. Under the military dictatorship of about half a dozen died. Barcelona, with a similar population, has 30 dailies. A few of these newspapers are purely official reports. Many of the newspapers were founded by political party groups. Some are morning, some are evening. In normal times, the contents are mostly political, local and national. But important sections are devoted to enlightening, columns being dedicated to gruesome details of murders.

REPRINT FROM OTHERS
The press generally is unable, owing to the financial straits, to keep the public informed of outside events because of the scarcity of cable tolls. If the readers take any interest in the news, they generally are obliged to content themselves with daily translations from newspapers arriving in two or

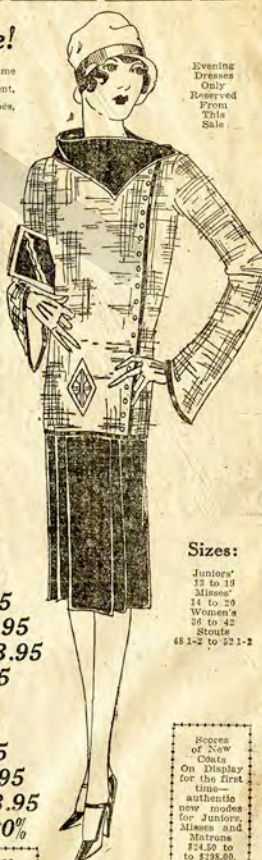

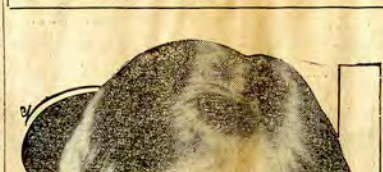

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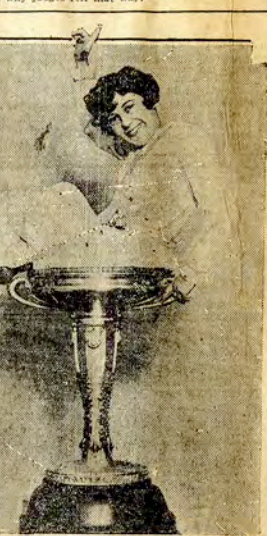

Invariably they demand to know whether I have changed my views held in the past.

Not many years ago this point of view was considered startling and revolutionary. Today it meets with far more general acceptance than some care to admit.
Even conservative people are beginning to realize that while marriage may be a matter of convenience, it is no bearing whatever either on emotional impulses or on expression.
Certainly the ritual of marriage has no bearing on the life and the instincts, no more than a public sanction of a private arrangement between two people. Never has the state been able to give more than this sanction, and it will always be love which dominates human relations.
I often smile at the old reference to a free love, although love could be anything but free! Nowadays, however, people submit to the ceremony of marriage, not because they believe in it, but because it protects them from the vulgar prying in their private lives.
MARRIAGE THE ANSWER
And so, if you behold me married today you have, then and now, if you care to have one! A marriage does not need to lead to a divorce of one's viewpoint.
The greatest offender against the sanctity of privacy has been the state. Since the reaction against it by the World War, the state has relinquished most of its other activities to the exclusive business of holding the individual by the throat.
No longer are freedom of movement or taste possible. Numberless restrictions surround the individual from mere to night. What he eats, drinks, reads, sees, the associations he makes, the opinions he hears, and when he foregoes them, are under compulsion.
The result is that the individual is constantly confronted with the need of devising methods by which he can escape the terrible social restrictions and obligations.
NECESSARY MODERN DEVICE
Efforts to thwart him without always create a genius for devising means of escape from within. This prohibition has only served to weld the American spirit. Suggestions of literary effort has only brought forth ever more revolutionary books. Incidentally, it has increased the demand for the unrestricted freedom of the press.
In the matter of travel, with the increasing interference by passport and visa, the state forces people to exercise their right to break through the Chinese wall built around the whole world, the state has only served to weld the American spirit. 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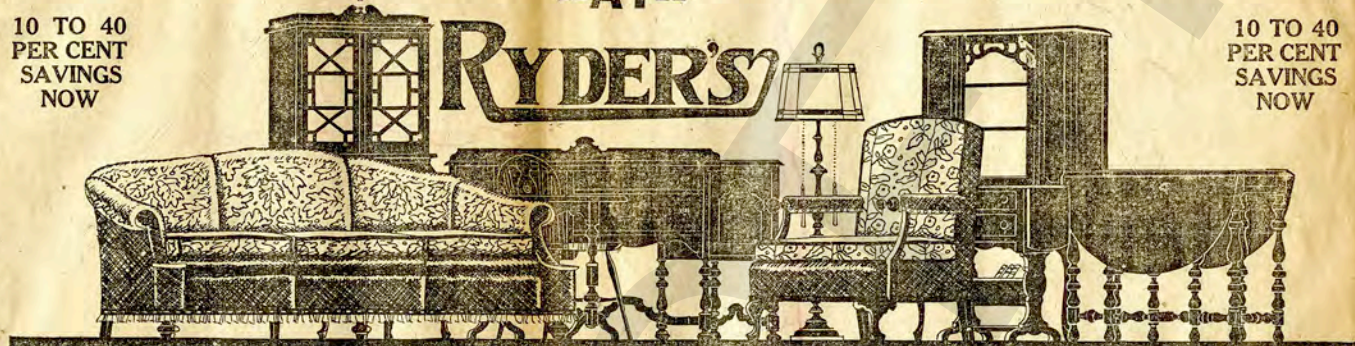

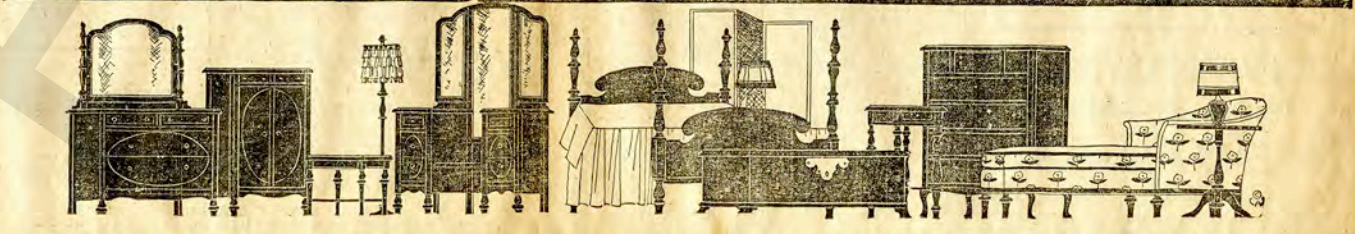

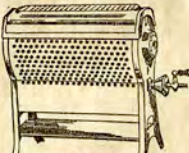

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FLOOD TRAPS SIX MINERS

100 Others Scramble To Safety As Underground Tubes Collapse

HARTZBURG, Pa., Nov. 17.—The fate of six miners entombed behind a tremendous rush of water 1200 feet underground in the Tombsen colliery of the Lehigh Valley coal company near here, remained a mystery today.

The men were trapped yesterday afternoon when a nearby creek broke through its banks, as a result of which heavy rains and flooded the mine. More than 100 other miners in the shaft survived the rush of the water and scrambled to the surface in time to escape imprisonment.
