PRESIDENT FECHA ENERO 15

### Carranza Declares Against Second Term As Mexican President

By Associated Press.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15.—Discussion, private and journalistic, of the question of electing a successor to Venustiano Carranza as president of Mexico in 1921 was given added impetus by what a leading pro-German morning paper calls its record "scoop" in securing an interview from President Carranza in which he stated he had not thought of, nor would he accept re-election. The fact that the new constitution expressly forbids two presidential terms was not mentioned in the "beat."

Among the candidates most frequently mentioned are Generals Pablo Gonzalez, who has on various occasions expressed himself as pro-ally, and General Alvaro Obregon, at present in business in Sonora.
