## MEXICAN, WIFE STOP IN CITY

**Government Official Pauses Here On Business Trip North**

Fernando Torreblanca, under-secretary of foreign affairs in the cabinet of President Ortiz Rubio of Mexico, and his wife, Hortensa Calles de Torreblanca, daughter of Former President Calles, spent the day in New Orleans yesterday with their two young daughters on their way North on an "important mission."

"We are going to spend about three months in Europe on a special mission for the president," Senor Torreblanca said. "What it is I cannot tell you; I am not even telling Senor Andre Horcasitas and the other New Orleans people who are seeing me while I am here."

The Torreblancas were met on arrival on the Southern Pacific at 7:35 a. m. by Fernando Alatorre, Mexican Consul, Adolfo Dominguez, vice-consul, Mr. Horcasitas of the Mexican railways, and other members of the Mexican colony at New Orleans. They spent the day seeing the city and left at 5 p. m. by the L. and N. railway. On their arrival in New York they will leave on the steamship Europa for Europe.

"Mexico is very happy and peaceful now," Senor Torreblanca said. "The business depression has not effected us greatly and the country is doing very well." He described previous visits to the city and told of his pleasure in being here again, "if only for such a short time."

Senora Torreblanca has also been in New Orleans before, living here about eight months when Arturo M. Elias was consul. Their children, Norma and Hortensia, are six and eight years old.
