Dear Professor Ecstein:

We would like to inform you that for twenty-two years there has existed in Mexico City a non-profit, private institution dedicated to higher education and to research work in the field of humanities and in some of the social sciences. Its name is El Colegio de México and it is directed by a group of well known personalities.

El Colegio de México has been publishing for thirteen years, besides its teaching and research activities, a hispanic, literary and philological review and a historical one, for ten years. It intends now to iniciate a quarterly publication on international affairs.

This, of course, would be a periodical devoted to give to the Spanish-speaking readers, that is to say, to Spain and to the nineteen Latin American countries, a notion of their own international problems and of those of the main nations or regions of the world. These problems are not only juridical, but political, economic, social and cultural as well.

The review would have an initial section dedicated to the publication of articles, of an average length of 4,500 to 9,000 words, in which a particular subject or theme, the presentation of which could be of international interest, would be dealt with. It would have a book-review section and another of documents, where those which could have a notable international repercussion would be reproduced.

El Colegio de México intends to pay the contributions it publishes: it offers a fee of 40 American dollars for an article, and from 10 to 20 dollars for a book-review, according to its extent. El Colegio does not pretend to acquire through these payments exclusive literary rights, that is to say, in all languages, but only in the Spanish language. In this maner, the authors who write in a language other than the Spanish, would be free to use those same articles for publications in reviews or periodicals in their own language.

El Colegio de México would like to invite you most heartily to send a contribution, perhaps on some of the topics you usually cover in your courses, as, for example, Contrasting Patterns of Economic development in Asia. We would like you to consider yourself a permanent collaborator of its periodical, so that you may send, without further invi-

tation, those articles and book-reviews that may come forth from your habitual work or activity, with the certainty that they will be most welcomed.

El Colegio de México would also appreciate very mucho if you could indicate to us the name and address of friends or colleagues of yours, whom you consider liable to be interested in cooperating with us.

In the hope of hearing from you soon, we remain.

Dear Dr. Villegas:

Thank you very much for your kind letter of November 30 which reached me with some delay. Last fall I have transferred from Harvard University and have accepted a professorship in international economics at the University of Rochester where I am now permanently located.

I was very interested to learn about your plans to initiate a quarterly publication on international affairs. I appreciate your invitation to become a permanent collaborator of your periodical and would be happy to do so. As a matter of fact, I have recently prepared a paper for the Annual Conference of the Milbank Memorial Fund. The topic of my paper is Manpower and Industrialization in Communist China. This is a paper of roughly 4500 words and if you are interested I will be happy to submit it to your Journal. This paper will be published in the proceedings of the Milbank Memorial Fund and I will of course have to get their permission before I could send it to you. However I will not seek this permission until I hear from you as to whether you are interested in it. Generally, as you may know, my interests lie principally in the field of economic development of underdeveloped areas. I do a great deal of my research and writing on the economy of Mainland China and occasionally also do some work on other Soviet-type economies. From time to time I write essays on the general problems of economic development. As I do this work I would be happy to send it in to you.

I would very much appreciate hearing further details concerning your Journal, as to when you plan to start publication, and whether you could send me perhaps some samples of numbers that already have been published or tell me further of your specific publication plans.
