## Province of The Most Holy Name Franciscan Fathers

My dear Confreere:

This is the first in what I hope will be a series of letters giving information concerning Holy Name Province and its enterprises.

Reporting on a fact-finding trip through the Southern Missions:

Pensacola, Florida. Fathers Gordon Krahe and Victorian Gass conduct the affairs of a colored parish. Buildings include: a church, friary, school and convent here. The school is in charge of four Allegany Sisters.

Americus, Georgia. Fathers Thomas A. Albert and Rayner Dray handle white parishes in Americus, Montezuma, Cordele and Tifton. Father Brendan Pyle is in charge of colored work in Americus and Albany. There are churches in both Americus and Cordele. Mass is offered in a club room in Tifton; in a private home in Montezuma. There are chapels in Americus and Albany for the colored. All the friars live in Americus. There are overnight quarters in Cordele and Albany.

Anderson, South Carolina. Father Francis A. Gorman conducts the affairs of a colored mission here. After some eight years, Father now has a large piece of property, a fine church, and a house used for club rooms. Father Francis lives with Father Daly, pastor of the white parish in Anderson. Plans are in the making for a friary.

Greenville, South Carolina. Fathers Timothy Judson and Barnabas Daniels handle a colored parish here. Buildings include: a friary with a church in the basement, a combination school and convent, and a large, mission-type metal building used as a recreation center. The school is in charge of four Stella Niagara Sisters. The Warwick Sisters also have a hospital in Greenville.

Asheville, North Carolina. This is another colored mission, our first in point of time. It is manned by Fathers Martin Collins and Neil P. O'Brien. Buildings include a combination church and school, a friary, a convent, and a mission-type recreation building. Four Allegany Sisters teach in the school.

Lenoir, North Carolina. This is our first parish in the South, in point of time. It is now manned by Fathers Peter Sheridan and Philip Kennedy. They have a church, and a friary; the latter is about half a mile from the church. The original friary is now a combination school and convent. There are three Allegany Sisters here.

Statesville, North Carolina. This is a white mission with a church; the friary is also about half a mile from the church. Father Lambert Zaleha, Provincial Delegate for the South, is presently pastor here; Father Louis Hamm is his assistant. It is my hope that we can soon relieve Father Lambert as pastor, so that he can give more time to the over-all situation.

Winston-Salem, North Carolina. This is the largest setup serving the colored. It is manned by Fathers Cajetan Foley and Columba Murphy. Twelve Allegany Sisters teach. There is a church and basement, a friary attached, and a school. On the far end of the property are a convent, and two buildings which house an Academy.

Emporia, Virginia. This is a white parish with white missions in Lawrenceville and South Hill. The pastor in Emporia is Father Ivo McElroy. Missions are handled by Father Kieran McMahon. The two chapels in use are below standard; one physically, the other from point of view of location. New ones are needed. In time a new chapel will probably be built in Emporia.

Clarksville, Virginia. Father Pancratius is pastor in Clarksville, a white parish; Father Clarence Goff handles the white mission in South Boston. The physical setup in Clarksville -- a church with friary attached -- is excellent. The one at South Boston is really bad and shall be remedied.

Some high lights on work in the South: Fathers are jacks-of-all-trades, doing much of their own work on maintenance and other projects. They cover many miles a day, e.g., Tifton is about 75 miles from Americus. Also re this mileage, in many instances it is necessary for the Fathers to go to families out in the country to teach catechism. The Fathers spread themselves in an attempt to have daily Mass in the missions. Opportunities come from time to time to conduct radio programs, to talk to small groups in the homes, and to hold study club classes. Those working with the colored generally do best if they are living in a district with their parishioners. So it goes. The Fathers are plenty busy.

One note re the schools. The pupils vary in number from about 30 to 200. The percentage of Catholic children is only about 20%.

The progress is slow -- the reaction to the work can cause discouragement -- still, the seed is being sown.

Our Chaplains are spread throughout the world: Gordian Ehrbacher, Navy; De Sales Nolan, Navy; Gervase McMillen, Navy -- teaching at Chaplain's School, Newport, Rhode Island; Gabriel Naughten, Navy -- Subic Bay, Philippines; Raymond Govern, Navy -- Carrier, Philippine Sea; Justin Eeles, Air Force -- Mitchell AFB, Hempstead, L. I.; Marcian Doyle, Navy -- Chaplain's School to Naval Air Station in Texas; Raymond Beane, Navy -- Transport Service, Atlantic; Giles Webster, Navy -- Transport Service, Pacific; Patrick Adams, Marines -- Combat, Korea; Brendan Bradley, Navy --

Chaplain's School to Naval Air Station, Texas; Sebastian McKenna, Air Force -- Griffis AFB, Rome, N. Y.; Finbar Dowd, Marines -- La Jeune, N. C.; Lawrence Pafchik, Navy -- Bremerton, Wash.; Timothy Quinn, Army -- Combat, Korea; Urban Cain, Air Force -- Japanese Defense Command; Cormac Walsh, Army -- Combat, Korea.

Father James McKee has been chosen to learn the practical aspects of the building business so that he may later act as an advisor to the Provincial Definitorium. He has started to observe the work and procedures in Brother Cajetan's office. He will follow step by step the building at Arch Street. Father James will live at 31st Street until January, then at Brookline.

Other assignments: Fathers Flavian Tobin and Conald Boland to Arch Street; Father Theophilus McNulty to Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital, Camden, N. J. (temporary duty).

Not needed just now in Brazil, Brother Mathias Will is now assigned as a butcher to Umbrian Farms.

Soon Brother Agapitus will go to Brazil on a temporary assignment to help organize, launch, and see well on its way, a carpenter shop.

The new Novitiate being built with monies earned by St. Anthony's Guild is fast taking shape. It has a Chapel wing, a wing for the Fathers; a dining hall and kitchen wing, and a novitiate wing. Practically all the steel is in place. Presently, the wing for the Fathers is enclosed with brick and a roof. Hope it will be ready for next fall!

The new Novitiate will have a constant-temperature room which will house the Provincial Archives. Before putting these original documents and records into permanent storage, they will be microfilmed.

Fathers Ralph Reilly, Louis Joyce, Harold Finn, Solanus Gallagher, Robert Frawley and Stanislaus Blackowski are beginning a new mission in Japan. Arranging for Mass, studying the language, and surveying the territory are the tasks of the moment. The contract for the territory of Gumma as a mission field for Holy Name Province is in the making. Gumma is northwest of Tokyo.

Fathers Seraphin Priestly and Victorian Rosboschil are in Hong Kong.

Work is about to begin in Arch Street. The new building will house two chapels and a public auditorium. When all three facilities are used, 2,400 can be accommodated for Mass. Also, there is a monastery chapel. The friary will have approximately 45 sleeping rooms with provision for the addition of about 20 more rooms later. It also has the usual complement of parlors, offices and the like. The building will be 11 stories high and will take about two years before completion -- the contract calls for 610 days.

I am going to make a visitation in Brazil during December. The next letter will inform you of the work there. Please continue to pray for the Definitorium and myself, that we may successfully conduct the affairs of your Province.
