This letter, under date of April 21, 1961, was signed six weeks before the death of the Sovereign Pontiff. It is notable for the concern which His Holiness revealed for the sacrifices made by the Church in the United States in cooperating with the Church in Latin America.

"The knowledge that this effort is not made without sacrifices regarding to money," stated His Holiness, "and this is also a guarantee of its success. He realizes that it is not superfluous personnel that is sent to these countries, but that grave domestic needs are curtailed in order to grant laudable aid to the Church in Latin America, which you regard as a wider field of action to which the concern of Catholics must be directed in order to assist this important and isolated member of the Mystical Body of Christ."

The suggestion was made by the Pontifical Commission in early 1958 that the bishops' Committee consider providing the Holy See with a similar summary of assignments every two years during the Decade of the 1960's, in order that the contributions in personnel of the various dioceses and religious communities in the United States might be properly recognized. This present Personal Statistical Report is a consequence of this suggestion, recently repeated by the Pontifical Commission.

Since this time the need of properly assembled data was foreseen by the Bishops' Committee, a special survey has not been necessary. A Personnel Data in the office of the Latin America Bureau, N.C.W.C., painstakingly gathers this data with the generous cooperation of all the organizations concerned.

In this regard, special appreciation is expressed to the National Secretariat of the Conference of Major Superiors of Men Religious and to the National Secretariat of the Conference of Major Superiors of Women Religious for placing their valuable records at the disposal of the Latin America Bureau. The precious assistance of the Mission Secretariat, N.C.W.C., is much appreciated. The National Secretariat of the Papal Volunteers for Latin America has likewise provided complete and exact data on lay personnel. In addition, scores of religious communities have quoted the central records according as this has been necessary.

FOREWORD

Late in 1962 His Eminence Cardinal Confalonieri, President of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America, requested of the Bishops' Committee for Latin America a report on the personnel supplied to date by the Church in the United States to the Church in Latin America.

A survey was initiated under the direction of His Excellency Archbishop McGucken of San Francisco, Chairman of the Bishops' Sub-Committee for Personnel. The requested personnel statement was addressed by Archbishop McGucken to His Holiness Pope John XXIII under date of March 19, 1963. His Holiness showed his satisfaction with this report by directing a holographic letter to "the Dioceses and Religious Congregations of the United States of America."

This letter, under date of April 21, 1963, was signed six weeks before the death of the Sovereign Pontiff. It is notable for the concern which His Holiness revealed for the sacrifices made by the Church in the United States in cooperating with the Church in Latin America.

"The knowledge that this effort is not made without sacrifices touches us deeply," stated His Holiness, "and this is also a guarantee of its success. We realize that it is not superfluous personnel that is sent to these countries, but that grave domestic needs are curtailed in order to grant laudable aid to the Church in Latin America, which you regard as a wider field of action to which the concern of Catholics must be channeled in order to assist this important and imperiled member of the Mystical Body of Christ."

The suggestion was made by the Pontifical Commission in early 1963 that the Bishops' Committee consider providing the Holy See with a similar summary of assignments every two years during the decade of the 1960's, in order that the contributions in personnel of the various dioceses and religious communities in the United States might be properly recognized. This present Second Biennial Report is a consequence of this suggestion, recently repeated by the Pontifical Commission.

Since this time the need of properly assembled data was foreseen by the Bishops' Committee, a special survey has not been necessary. A Personnel Desk in the office of the Latin America Bureau, N.C.W.C., painstakingly gathers this data with the generous cooperation of all the organizations concerned.

In this regard, special appreciation is expressed to the National Secretariat of the Conference of Major Superiors of Men Religious and to the National Secretariat of the Conference of Major Superiors of Women Religious for placing their valuable records at the disposal of the Latin America Bureau. The gracious assistance of the Mission Secretariat, N.C.W.C., is much appreciated. The National Secretariat of the Papal Volunteers for Latin America has likewise provided complete and exact data on lay personnel. In addition, scores of religious communities have updated the central records according as this has been necessary.

GENERAL RECAPITULATION: U.S. DIOCESAN, RELIGIOUS,

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

A survey of January 1, 1962, of the U.S. Catholic personnel in Latin America established that the total priests, Brothers, Sisters and lay volunteers from the United States at work in Latin America numbered 2,761. The corresponding total for January 1965 is 4,091. This represents a gain of 1,330, or 48.1% over the 1962 record.

The sum of priests, both diocesan and religious, and of Brothers comes to 1849, a gain of 473 or 34.3% over the 1962 figure. The diocesan clergy hails from 49 dioceses, while the religious clergy and Brothers belong to 102 non-province communities or to provinces of multi-province communities.

The total of 1,883 Sisters represents a gain of 694, or 58.3%, over the 1962 figure. These Sisters are members of 161 communities of women.

Of the 102 religious units contributing priests and Brothers, 70 currently possess less than ten members in Latin America. Of the 161 communities of Sisters, 112 communities currently possess less than ten members in Latin America. These religious organizations may be said to represent the newer forces entering the Latin American apostolate.

On the other hand, the relatively few religious organizations that have been at work in Latin America for a longer period have likewise increased their field staffs quite substantially. Thus it results that the four communities of men and the five communities of women that are currently the largest contributors of personnel account for a total contribution of 1,333, or 32.5% of the religious workers presently in Latin American service.

U.S. personnel are at work in 26 of the 35 independent nations or dependent territories of the Latin American orbit. The heaviest concentrations are stationed in three political divisions, namely, Peru, Brazil and Puerto Rico. Total of personnel in these areas comes to 1,853, or 45.3% of the total Latin American contribution.

DISTRIBUTION OF U.S. DIOCESAN CLERGY, RELIGIOUS,
AND LAY PERSONNEL IN LATIN AMERICA, JANUARY, 1965

TRENDY ANALYSIS

This country-by-country analysis establishes that 54 of the 85 political divisions in Latin America (which include the independent nations and all dependent territorial) receive personnel supplied by the Church in the United States.

The divisions not currently served are Cuba, Guyana, French Guiana, Suriname, Guadeloupe, Martinique, the Netherlands Overseas Territory, and the British Virgin Islands.

It is true that Church authorities in the United States, quite in with Church authorities in Europe, have moved numerous clerics from the Church authorities in Latin America to a great extent without the guidance of any type of coordinated plan. In the past, U.S. Church authorities which could give both Latin America and the United States a more coordinated, systematic approach to the distribution of personnel have not done so. The United States has a great need for such personnel.

II.

DISTRIBUTION OF U.S. DIOCESAN CLERGY,
RELIGIOUS, AND LAY PERSONNEL

IN LATIN AMERICA

Such personnel, and in particular in Latin America, will be welcomed when it is ready. However, Church authorities in the United States feel generally uneasy that while certain disparities exist in the distribution of their personnel, Latin America's needs are so grave everywhere that an U.S. personnel currently at work in Latin America is being wasted.

Summary Statistics of U.S. Personnel At the time that 4,900 bishops, priests, brothers, sisters and lay ministers from the United States in Latin America in January 1965, 1,434 or some 29% later in those political divisions -- Brazil, Peru and Puerto Rico. Brazil counts 815, or 48%, and Peru has an approximately 10%. Puerto Rico possesses the balance in this category.

At the other extreme, fifteen political divisions possess less than 75 U.S. workers. Five are in South America -- Argentina (27), British Guiana (70), Ecuador (20), Paraguay (14), and Venezuela (17). The remaining ten political divisions in this lowest category are in Middle America or the Caribbean -- Costa Rica (61), El Salvador (71), Honduras (77), Nicaragua (87), Guatemala (6), Dominican Republic (93), Haiti (97), Trinidad (11), U.S. Virgin Islands (47), West Indies Federation (57).

Of the nine political divisions in the intermediate category, four possess 75 to 150 workers from the United States -- Bahamas (63), Panama (87), British Honduras (88), and Colombia (111). Five possess 150 to 750 workers from the United States -- Jamaica (165), Mexico (191), Guatemala (191), Chile (227), and Bolivia (315).

Distribution of U.S. Personnel relative to gross population Distribution of U.S. personnel on the basis of its relative strength in relation to the population of the various political divisions throws a different light on the disparities.

DISTRIBUTION OF U.S. DIOCESAN CLERGY, RELIGIOUS,
AND LAY PERSONNEL IN LATIN AMERICA, JANUARY, 1965

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

This country-by-country analysis establishes that 27 of the 35 political divisions in Latin America (which include the independent nations and all dependent territories) possess personnel supplied by the Church in the United States.

The divisions not currently served are Cuba, Uruguay, French Guiana, Surinam, Guadeloupe, Martinique, the Netherlands Overseas Territory, and the British Virgin Islands.

It is true that Church authorities in the United States, quite as with Church authorities in Europe, have answered numerous appeals from the Church authorities in Latin America to a great extent without the guidance of that type of coordinated planning on the part of Latin American authorities which would give both Latin Americans and North Americans the assurance that the limited apostolic resources were going to the Latin American areas with greatest need.

Such planning, now in process in Latin America, will be welcomed when it is ready. However, Church authorities in the United States feel generally assured that while certain disparities occur in the distribution of their personnel, Latin America's needs are so grave almost everywhere that no U.S. personnel currently at work in Latin America is being wasted.

Numerical distribution of U.S. personnel Of the better than 4,000 Bishops, priests, Brothers, Sisters and lay volunteers from the United States in Latin America in January 1965, 1,853 or some 45% labor in three political divisions -- Brazil, Peru and Puerto Rico. Brazil counts 618, or 15%, and Peru 589 or approximately 14%. Puerto Rico possesses the balance in this category.

At the other extreme, fifteen political divisions possess less than 75 U.S. workers. Five are in South America -- Argentina (52), British Guiana (20), Ecuador (50), Paraguay (14), and Venezuela (64). The remaining ten political divisions in this lowest category are in Middle America or the Caribbean -- Costa Rica (61), El Salvador (21), Honduras (72), Nicaragua (67), Barbados (8), Dominican Republic (42), Haiti (47), Trinidad (5), U.S. Virgin Islands (42), West Indies Federation (32).

Of the nine political divisions in the intermediate category, four possess 75 to 150 workers from the United States -- Bahamas (88), Panama (89), British Honduras (85), and Colombia (131). Five possess 150 to 350 workers from the United States -- Jamaica (166), Mexico (241), Guatemala (183), Chile (329), and Bolivia (319).

Distribution of U.S. personnel relative to gross population Distribution of U.S. personnel on the basis of its relative strength in relation to the population of the various political divisions throws a different light on the disparities.

Brazil, for instance, with its 618 total is rated high if we consider its U.S. personnel in absolute terms. But when its great population is taken into consideration, it is served only in mediocre fashion. With 76,600,000 people, it averages only one U.S. worker to each 124,000 of its population. Conclusions This report does not draw conclusions as regards the specific results which may flow from disparities in the distribution of U.S. apostolic personnel in Latin America. Such conclusions fall within the province of authorized and properly qualified Latin American specialists.

However, the simple fact may be recorded that Brazil, Venezuela, Nicaragua, Haiti, El Salvador, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala and Honduras on the one hand suffer from a grave shortage in clergy and on the other hand are serviced in very meager fashion so far as concerns personnel from the United States, due consideration being given to the gross population and the servicing of the faithful in these nations.

GENERAL ANALYSIS

I - U.S. Diocesan Clergy in Latin America as of January 1965. The U.S. Diocesan Clergy in Latin America totaled 179, the great majority of this body being for short-term service.

These priests hail from 25 archdioceses and dioceses, with by far the largest contribution from the Archdiocese of Boston. There, by the initiative of Cardinal Cushing, the American Society of St. James the Apostle was founded. Of 26 priests of the Archdiocese are members of this Society. Total U.S. membership in the Society numbering members in 14, with a number of additional ministers from other countries.

III.

Besides the large percentage of priests, many other dioceses have joined lists of more priests for the Latin American continent. Jefferson City, 19; St. Louis, 15; Boston, 12; New York, 10; Camden, 6; Bridgeport and Kansas City-At. Joseph (Mo.), 5.

The majority of these Latin America missions are concentrated in the operation of parishes. As of January 1965, a total of 59 were under their care in 19 parishes. Distribution of these parishes is as follows: Peru, 23; Bolivia, 15; Guatemala, 4; Brazil, 4; Ecuador, 3; Chile, 2; Venezuela, 1, and one each in Colombia, El Salvador, Honduras and Panama.

Of these 59 parishes, 11 are in Peru, 10 in Bolivia, 3 in Ecuador, 2 in Chile, 1 in Venezuela, 1 in Guatemala, 1 in Honduras, 1 in El Salvador, 1 in Panama, 1 in Colombia, 1 in Brazil, and 1 in Guatemala. The Diocese of Jefferson City conducts 4; the Archdiocese of St. Louis, 3; the Diocese of Camden, 2; and the Diocese of Buffalo and Rochester, 1 each. The remaining 18 are each respectively the responsibility of 19 U.S. archdioceses or dioceses.

On no previous occasion in the history of the Church in the United States have so many dioceses on their own initiative undertaken to send such a substantial number of their diocesan personnel at the disposal of bishops in other nations to meet a crisis.

II - Religious Communities of Men. The extent of cooperation on the part of religious communities of men is best demonstrated by listing the contributions of personnel by the organizations which have no provinces and by the individual provinces of the multi-province communities.

Non-province communities on the list total 20 and individual provinces of the multi-province communities total 77, thus providing an over-all total of 97 individuals.

A heavy percentage of these 107 non-province communities and individual provinces of multi-province communities have assumed obligations in Latin America during the past several years. Hence it is not surprising that of these 107 individuals, 70 have as yet less than two months in service in Latin America. Fourteen

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

1 - U.S. Diocesan Clergy in Latin America As of January 1965, the U.S. diocesan clergy in Latin America totaled 179, the great majority of this body pledged for short-term service.

These priests hail from 49 archdioceses and dioceses, with by far the heaviest contribution from the Archdiocese of Boston. There, on the initiative of Cardinal Cushing, the Missionary Society of St. James the Apostle was founded, and 39 priests of the Archdiocese are members of this Society. Total U.S. membership in the Society serving overseas is 74, with a number of additional volunteers from other countries.

Besides the large contingent from Boston, seven other dioceses have loaned five or more priests for the Latin American apostolate: Jefferson City, 12; St. Louis, 10; Newark, 8; San Diego, 7; Camden, 6; Bridgeport and Kansas City-St. Joseph (Mo.), 5 each.

The apostolate of the U.S. diocesan clergy in Latin America consists predominantly in the operation of parishes. As of January 1965, a total of 59 were under their care in eleven countries. The geographic distribution of these parishes is as follows: Peru, 22; Bolivia, 15; Guatemala, 6; Brazil, 5; Ecuador, 3; Chile, 2; Venezuela, 2; and one each in Colombia, El Salvador, Honduras and Panama.

Of these 59 parishes, 26 are conducted by the St. James Society (15 in Peru, 8 in Bolivia, 3 in Ecuador). The Diocese of Jefferson City conducts 4; the Archdiocese of St. Louis, 3; the Diocese of Camden, 3; and the Dioceses of Buffalo and Paterson, 2 each. The remaining 19 are each respectively the responsibility of 19 U.S. archdioceses or dioceses.

On no previous occasion in the history of the Church in the United States have so many Bishops on their own initiative undertaken to place such a substantial number of their diocesan personnel at the disposal of Bishops in other nations to meet a crisis.

2 - Religious Communities of Men The extent of cooperation on the part of religious communities of men is best demonstrated by listing the contributions of personnel by the communities which have no provinces and by the individual provinces of the multi-province communities.

Non-province communities on the list total 25 and individual provinces of the multi-province communities total 77, thus providing an over-all total of 102 listings.

A heavy percentage of these 102 non-province communities and individual provinces of multi-province communities have assumed obligations in Latin America during the past several years. Hence it is not surprising that of these 102 listings, 70 have as yet less than ten members in service in Latin America. Fourteen

of the listings have 10 to 25 members in the field, while twelve have 26 to 49. Three have between 50 and 100 -- namely, the Franciscan Conventuals of Syracuse, N.Y. (59), the Benedictines of St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minn. (68), and the New England Province of the Society of Jesus (68). Three others have more than 100 -- namely, the Holy Name Province of the O.F.M.'s (101), the Baltimore Province of the Redemptorists (157), and the Maryknoll Fathers (297), a non-province community.

While this examination of the contributions of the individual provinces is informing, a great deal is to be gained by a consideration not only of the total combined performance of the multi-province communities but of the joint contributions of the various religious families as well.

Fourteen abbeys of the Benedictines, operating with traditional independence in twelve different political divisions of Latin America, demonstrate the widespread interest within this family of religious. They supply a total personnel of 125, over half of whom, however, hail from St. John's Abbey of Collegeville -- previously mentioned -- which initiated its Latin American connection a quarter of a century ago.

Smaller contributors among non-province communities are the Trappists of St. Joseph's Abbey, Spencer, Mass., with 28 members in Argentina and Chile, and the Trinitarians with 13 members in Puerto Rico.

Among the 77 U.S. provinces of the multi-province communities at work in Latin America, the Franciscan family comprises the largest group. Twelve U.S. provinces contribute a total of 342 persons, of whom 8 are Bishops, 289 priests and 45 Brothers. Four provinces of the O.F.M. account for 191, three Capuchin provinces for 65, and the Conventuals of Syracuse, N.Y., for 59.

Among the earliest U.S. communities to supply staff to Latin America were the Redemptorists. Today, four U.S. provinces furnish 5 Bishops, 202 priests and 2 Brothers, a total of 209.

Ten provinces of the Society of Jesus supply 2 Bishops, 143 priests and 3 Brothers, a total of 148.

Eight families of religious communities with a total of 27 provinces supply contingents of personnel which again demonstrate the widespread interest in serving Latin America: four provinces of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, 83; three provinces of Marianists, 74; four provinces of the Holy Cross, 44; two provinces of Vincentians, 34; Holy Ghost, 32; seven provinces of Christian Brothers, 32; three provinces of Dominicans, 24; three provinces of Augustinians, 14.

3 - Religious Communities of Women The religious communities of women have increased their total personnel in Latin America by some 58% over the January 1962 total. The U.S. communities of women with personnel in Latin America now total 161.

The great majority of these communities have taken up Latin American work within the last five years and thus of these 161, 112 communities -- or 69% of the whole -- have less than ten Sisters in Latin America. Twenty-nine communities have

between 10 and 25 Sisters in the field. Fifteen have between 26 and 49, while five communities have 50 or over.

The contributions of these last five are as follows: School Sisters of Notre Dame, Wilton, Conn., 51; Sisters Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, West Chester, Pa., 60; Dominican Sisters, Adrian, Mich., 61; Sisters of St. Joseph, Brentwood, Long Island, N.Y., 74; Maryknoll Sisters, 242.

Again there is value in examining the joint contributions of the various religious families of Sisters.

In the Franciscan family, 29 communities have contributed 309 members to Latin America. Thirteen communities of Dominican Sisters have contributed 245. The Sisters of St. Joseph, eight communities, have contributed 121. Four communities of the Immaculate Heart of Mary contribute 128. The Charity family, six communities, has given 105; the Mercy family, nine communities in the Union and five independent, 99; the Notre Dame family, eight communities, 86.

Smaller contributions run as follows: Benedictine Sisters (thirteen communities), 60; Precious Blood (four communities), 44; Sacred Heart of Mary (two communities), 37; Ursulines (four provinces of the Roman Union and one independent community), 34; Providence Sisters (five communities), 31; Medical Mission Sisters (one community), 27; Carmelites (three communities), 12; Sacred Heart of Jesus (four communities), 11; Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart (one community), 11.

4 - Lay Volunteers Currently 105 Bishops of the United States have named diocesan directors for the recruitment and sending out of Papal Volunteers for Latin America. Of these, 64 have PAVLA workers in the field today. The total workers sent out directly by the dioceses is 292. In addition, 67 lay volunteers who are members of four independently operating lay sending societies are allied with the Papal Volunteer movement and thus recognized by the Bishops as possessing a right to the title. Thus the total of PAVLA workers as of January 1965 is 359.

Of particular interest in this report is the vital influence of the Bishops of the United States in the development of this movement. Outstanding in the contribution of PAVLA candidates from their dioceses are the eight Ordinaries each of whom has ten or more overseas today. They rank as follows: Kansas City, Kansas, 22; St. Louis, 19; Chicago, 17; Manchester, 14; Kansas City-St. Joseph, Missouri, 13; Sioux City, 12; Wichita, 12; Davenport, 10.

Papal Volunteers labor currently in fourteen countries and dependent territories. In seven of these they count twenty or more in service: Brazil, 80; Peru, 55; Colombia, 40; Chile, 35; Mexico, 35; British Honduras, 31; and Bolivia, 20. The remaining countries report as follows: Guatemala, 19, Ecuador, 16; Jamaica, 11; Venezuela, 7; and one each in Costa Rica, Panama and Trinidad.
